**CORNER'S INQUEST.**—On Tuesday last, two inquests  
were held by Richard Foot, Esq. one of the Coroners for the  
county Cork, at Dinnullog, near Musureagh mountain, on  
the bodies of Michael Murphy and Timothy Long; the fol-  
lowing were the circumstances:—One Darby Callaghan, who  
had been tenant to Counsellor Leader, and by whom his cattle  
had been distrained, contrived means to take them off, and  
shortly afterwards Patrick Dawley, the son of Mr. Leader's  
steward, accompanied by several other persons, some of whom  
as well as himself, were armed with guns, pursued, and on  
Saturday last succeeded in getting possession of them, at a  
place called Rylane; but a party of Callaghan's having shortly  
appeared armed with sticks and stones rescued them; during  
the conflict Dawley, frequently presented his gun and missed  
fire, but at length having exchanged his for another, discharged  
it at the opposite party, by which Murphy received a bullet  
wound at the right side of his breast, which came through at  
the opposite side, and is supposed to have afterwards hit Long,  
as there was but one shot fired, and Long was behind Murphy  
going off. Murphy died in a few hours after having bled to  
death, and Long lingered until Tuesday morning when he  
died. These were the leading features of the case, and each  
jury returned a verdict—“That each came by his death in  
consequence of a bullet wound received from a gun shot, fired  
at Rylane, in this county, by one Pat. Dawley
