We have received the London Journals of Wednesday and Thursday.

Intelligence has been received from our army which was destined to act against New Orleans, and we are sorry to say, that is of a very melancholy complexion. The expedition has entirely failed; and we have sustained a loss amounting to 886 killed, 1,516 wounded, and 552 missing—in all, 2,354 men. All that military skill and courage could achieve was done; but the superior numbers of the enemy, and the strong position he took, baffled every effort of our brave army, which, with its stores, artillery, &c. reembarked at Bayou, where it had originally landed. We are sincerely sorry to see the following names among the killed, and wounded.
