RERRY CATHOLIC MEETING.

A most nomerous and respectable meeting of the Roman Catholics of the County Kerry, was held in the Charel of Trales, on last Saturday.—John O'Connell, of Grena, Esq. in the Chair:—The Resolutions, moved by Counse for O'Connell, seconded by Mr. Mahony.

It was resolved to instruct their Representatives, that no measure of Emand pation would be accepted, or satisfactory, but Unqualified Repeal. The Knight of Lerry, one of the Representatives, attended the Meeting, and spoke at considerable length. He observed, that he full much personal gratification in the recollection of his having resisted—the Veto in every shape from its first appearance, -he reminded the Meeting, that when Mr. Ponsonby, in the House of Commons in 1809, amounced the willingness of the Catholics of Ireland to admit the Veto, he (the Knight of Kerry), nevertheless, resisted it, on the ground, that he, as a conscientious Protestant, would not submit to have his Religion subjected to the control of persons of another communion, and therefore he fell himself equally bound in conscience not to be a party to any ar angement which would subject his Catholic countrymen to the endurance of a religious grievance, to which he himself would not submit.
