In consequence of the orders received on Thursday after- noon at Deal, by a messenger from the Admiralty, all the King's ships in the downs were directed to proceed to the opposite coast Redpoule, Challenger, and Dexterous, ac- cordingly, immediately prepared to unmoor and get under weigh.

KERRY CATHOLIC MEETING.

A most numerous and respectable meeting of the Ro- man Catholics of the County Kerry, was held in the Chapel of Tralee, on last Saturday.—John O'Connell, of Grena, Esq. in the Chair.—The Resolutions, moved by Counselor O'Connell, seconded by Mr. Mahony.

It was resolved to instruct their Representatives, that no measure of Emancipation would be accepted, or satisfactory, but Unqualified Repeal. The Knight of Kerry, one of the Representatives, attended the Meeting, and spoke at considerable length. He obser- ved, that he felt much personal gratification in the re- collection of his having resisted—the Veto in every shape from its first appearance,—he reminded the Meeting, that when Mr. Ponsonby, in the House of Commons in 1809, announced the willingness of the Catholics of Ireland to admit the Veto, he (the Knight of Kerry), nevertheless, resisted it, on the ground, that he, as a conscientious Protestant, would not submit to have his Religion subjected to the controul of persons of another communion, and therefore he felt himself equally bound in conscience not to be a party to any arrangement which would subject his Catholic country- men to the endurance of a religious grievance, to which he himself would not submit.
