The assizes of Mayo ended on Thursday se'nnight-Zourteen men were convicted on the clearest and most satisfactory evidence of having appeared in arms on the night of 29th of October last, at Friarstown in that county, having treshed and scattered coin, the property of Mr. Ormsby, under agent to the Earl of Limerick's property, in the county Mayo, and having committed burglary in the house of his Herd. Justice Johnson passed sentence of death on them all - seven were hanged yeeterday and seven to be hanged on Monday next. -At said assizes eight men were sentenced to be transported for life for sheep stealing -Thomas Walsh, for bigamy, to be transported 14 years, and Joseph O'Donnell, attorney, for assaulting the Right Hon. Denn's Brown, was convicted sentenced to be passed in the King's Bench.

At said assizes, Serjeant Ormsby, who brought an action of damages for £1000 against Sir Neal O'Donnell, for dela-

mation, was non suited.

At the city Cork assizes, Rowland Reeves, card manufacturer, was tried on Thursday, for having forged dies for stamping cards in his possession, and was acquitted. The trial of Mr. Thomas Nugent, of that place, for vending forged playing cards in this city, was postponed by the crown, until next assizes.

At Union Hall, London, on Saturday se onight, Elizabeth Shaw, was charged by Mr. James Brooker with bigamy, she having married him during the life time of her first busband, Charles Shields, well knowing at the time of her ocond marriage that her first husband was living : the prisoner is a young woman of respectable connections, and extremely interesting in her appearance. From the circumstances of the case, as they were detailed, it appeared that Mr. Shields and Mr Brooker had both been declared admirers of the lady for some time. At length the preference was given to Mr. Shields -Mr. B. was dismissed; and on the day fixed, the 23d Feb. last, she was married at Carbon hurch to Mir S. Scarcely had they quitted the church before she repented the choice she had riade, and, before an hour had expired, eloped from her new lord, and a second time gave permission to Mr Brooker to address her : the preliminary steps were soon arranged, and. on the 27th Feb four days afterher marriage to Mr. Shelds at Christ church, she was led to the parish church of St George the Martyr by Mr. Brooker, and a second time pronounced the marriage vows. It appeared from the festimony of Mr. Brooker, sen, who was present at his son's marriage, that she stated the circumstance of her previous marriage with Mr. Shields, but said it was of no force, inasmuch as it had not been consummated - She was committed for trial at theassizes:

W. ARMAGH MANNERS, C. G. HEWEPTA HEREAS the time insited by the Proclamstion of the Lord Lieutenant and Conneil of Ireland, of the Fourth Day of October last, for prohibiting the exportation out of Ire and, or carrying. Coastwise Gunpowder or Sali-Petre, on any sort of Arms or Ammunition will expire on the lough day of April instant s

And whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition should be continued for some time large.

Now we the Lords Justices and Council, do herehy order, require, prohibit, and command that no Peryou or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for his Majesty's service,) do at any time during the Space of Six Months from the date bereof, presume to transport into any part out of Ireland or earry Constwise any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any sort of arms or Ammunition or ship de lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Americanition on board any thip or vessel in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same Coa fwise, without leave or permission in the behalf first obtained from the Lord Lieutenant or other chief Gove nor or Governors and Privy Conneil of Ireland, upon pain of mcorring and suffering the respective fortettures and penalties inflicted by an act passed in Great Britain in the Twenty Ninth year of his tale Majesiy's Reign, entitled, " An act to empower his, Majesty to prohibit "the exportation of Sail-Petre, and to enforce the " law for empowering his Majesty to prohibit the "exportation of Gunpowder, or apy sort of Arms or " Ammunition; and also to empoyer his Majesty to " restrain the carrying Coas, wise of Salt Petre, Guisd powner, or any sort of Arms or Ammunition?

And the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs are in give the necessary Orders berein as lot them may respectively appertain.
