Since our last, we have received the London Journals up to the 27th ult inclusive. They supply us with a variety of very interesting French news, from which we have made very ample extracts, given in our preceding columns.

Second Edition.

General Advertiser Office, Four o'Clock.

We stop the Press to announce this day's mail, with the London Papers of the 28th and 29th by express—We extract the following:—

From America, we are sorry to say, intelligence of rather an unpleasant nature has been received. A small expedition was detached in the boats of Sir George Cockburn's squadron, for the purpose of destroying some works in the river St. Mary, and it has proved fruitless. Our brave men were exposed to the galling fire of the enemy's sharpshooters from the woods on the banks of the river, during their retreat, and we have sustained a loss of 20 killed and wounded.

Among the latter are Captains Phillott and Bartholomew. The news of the peace arrived on the 2d of March, but was too late to prevent this unsuccessful attack which took place on the 23d of February.

The discussion in the House of Commons on Friday evening, relative to the subject of peace or war, terminated against Mr. Whitbread's motion, by a division of 273 to 72. Lord Castlereagh triumphed over his opponents in a brilliant speech of most powerful efficacy, and was repeatedly cheered in the most enthusiastic manner.

Embarkation of troops.—The following regiments will be embarked at Cove immediately.—The 39d, 42d, and 92d.—The first embarked on board the transports on Tuesday, and the other two on Wednesday and Thursday next. The 13th and 15th regiments of light dragoons will also be embarked as soon as the horse transports arrive. The whole then sail for Ostend, where they are to be disembarked, for the purpose of joining the troops under the command of the Duke of Wellington. On Tuesday the 38th regiment marched in to Cork from Kinsale, to do duty in the place of the 32d.

Wednesday two divisions of the 1st regiment of Life Guards, and 400 of the Queen's Bays, left London to embark for the Netherlands.

The foot guards are to be commanded by Major Generals Cooke, Byng, and Maitland. Head quarters at Oudeoord, by the last letters.

The Earl of Dalhousie, Sir Thomas Picton, and Sir Lowry Cole are to re-assume their commands, as Lieut. Generals under the Duke of Wellington.

WAR IN INDIA.

A private letter has been received from India, stating, that an unsuccessful attack had been made by a detachment under the orders of Major Gen. Gillespie, upon the fort of Kolugoa, in the Nepal country.

Colonel Ochterlony is also reported to have taken a fort against which he was to act, but with considerable loss.

The substance of the treaty of Vienna of the 28th March, was on Tuesday laid before parliament.

Lieut. Gen. Sir Brent Spencer, G. C. B. has been returned to serve in parliament for the borough of Sligo, in the room of Joshua Spencer, Esq. who has accepted the office of Treasurer of Munster.

DUEL.—Tuesday se'nnight a duel took place between Captain E—h, and Lieutenant B—l, both of the 35th regiment. The dispute arose in the ball room at Chichester, (where the regiment was quartered some weeks since), from Captain E's having been promised to dance with a young lady, a Miss T—t when Lieut. B. had previously been engaged to her. The parties met in the neighbourhood of Seaford, where they exchanged shots, and Lieut. B. received a slight wound in the breast. After the affair the parties amiably shook hands.

A duel has been fought at Brussels between the Hon. Mr. Capel, and Baron Tripp, but without injury to either party.

In consequence of the retirement of Lord Castlecoote, as Chief Commissioner, of the Custom Board, there will be a vacancy for a junior Commissioner. Some active candidates are already in motion; amongst the number is Mr. O'Brien, brother of Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. of Dromoland, Co. Clare, M. P. and who, it is thought, has a strong chance of success, through the Thomond and Charlemont interest. In all probability his Lordship retires on an allowance from Government equivalent to his services. He will, of course be succeeded by Mr. Vandeleur.

On Sunday last, Lieut. Smith of the Royal Navy, arrived in this City, where he is ordered to continue on the Impress service, to raise men for His Majesty's fleet in this Port.

Yesterday morning, four parties from the Staff of the Co. Limerick Militia were dispatched from this to Rathkeale, Newcastle Reuff and Ballinacree, where they are to recruit.
