THE NEW MILITIA BILL.

The Militia Bill, brought in by Mr. Addington, con- tains the following Clauses :—
 "To give half pay to such officers of the militia who volunteered into the provisional battalions in 1813, as were appointed under commissions from the King, as well as to those who were accepted; as was evi- dently the intention of the act. To enable Captains, as well as Subalterns, who have volunteered from the militia into the line, with their proper quota of men, to hold their half pay, together with their full pay, in case of their again accepting commissions in the mili- tia. By the 42d of the King, this is only allowed to Subalterns.—To indemnify those counties, whose mili- tia were kept embodied from the 25th of June, 1814, from the expense of maintaining the wives and Fam- ilies of the men thereunto belonging from that time.— To provide additional means of holding courts martial in the militia when disembodied, by extending the dis- tance of commanding the attendance of officers. To enabling the King to call out the militia for less than 28 days (if he should think proper,) in time of peace.—To provide depots for the arms of the Scotch militia, when in a disembodied state."

After discharg- ing two shots each, Mr. Wallace received a slight wound in the hip, which terminated the affair, and both the gentlemen left the ground perfectly reconciled.

 DUSSELDORF, April 28.
 An extra Supplement to our Gazette, which has this moment appeared, contains the following news, which we hope to see soon confirmed :
 "FRONTIERS OF ITALY, APRIL 22.
 "The number Couriers, preceded by postillions blowing their horns, that are this moment passing is so great that it is impossible for us to count them :—they are going to Vienna and other capitals of Germany, with the news of the total defeat of the army of Joachim, pursued and attacked on all sides by the Austrians, the English, and the Sicilians, as well as by the Tuscans :
 He has fallen into the hands of the conquerors, with many thousands of his troops: We expect to morrow the confir- mation of the details of this news.
