NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC. 22
Illicit Distillation.

WHEREAS the unlicensed Distillation of Spirit,
 notwithstanding the exertions that have been
 used for its Suppression still continues to be carried
 on throughout Ireland almost as extensively as heret-
 ofore, to the great injury of the Revenue, the Des-
 truction of Morals, and in many instances producing
 the perpetration of the greatest crimes. And Whereas
 the general prevalence of this illicit practice is princi-
 pally to be attributed to the encouragement given
 thereto by the consumption of illegal Spirits in private
 Families, and in the house of unlicensed retailers.—
 And Whereas all Persons whatsoever receiving, or hav-
 ing Spirits in their possession, whether for their own
 use or for Sale, are required by the existing laws to
 have the same protected by Permits, or by Certifi-
 cates founded thereon, granted by the proper Officers,
 or in default thereof such Spirits may be seized; and
 for that purpose any Officer of the Revenue is autho-
 rised to enter into all Houses, Stores and Cellars be-
 longing to any person having in his or her possession
 any such Spirits; and if any person shall refuse to per-
 mit, or shall not suffer such Officer to enter, or remain
 in his or her House, Cellar, Storehouse, &c. to search
 for any Spirits, upon which the duties shall not have
 been fully paid, and which such Officer shall have no
 reasonable cause to suspect to be concealed or depo-
 sited therein, he is empowered by law, in the day
 time, and in the presence of a Constable, to break open
 and enter any such house, &c. and to search for, seize,
 and carry away all such Spirits found therein. And
 Whereas the operation of these several provisions has
 not been extended to the house of private Gentlemen,
 and others, having Spirits merely for their own con-
 sumption, which indulgence has been very generally
 abused by the open and avowed use of smuggled Spirits
 in their several Families: Now the Commissioners
 of Excise and Taxes, for the more effectual suppres-
 sion of Illicit Distillation, do give notice, that they
 are determined strictly to enforce, without any reserve
 or distinction whatever, all the several laws made for
 the protection of the Revenue arising from Spirituous
 Liquors; and they do hereby enjoin and command
 their several Officers to be active and vigilant in disco-
 vering and prosecuting all offenders against the same:
 And they do further, promise the most liberal encou-
 ragement to all Informers, or bringers of private in-
 formation which may lead to the detection and con-
 viction of such persons, more especially under the §
 Act of the present Session of Parliament, imposing a
 penalty of One Hundred Pounds upon persons buying
 or receiving Spirits without Permit, or knowing that
 the same had not paid the King's duties; and they also
 engage that the names of all such Informers shall be
 kept inviolably secret.
