

Vienna, brought by Mr. Guy, the King's messenger, who landed at Dover, on Friday night, from the Lord Duncan packet. Mr. Guy was accompanied by two foreign messengers. We are given to understand that the dispatches are of considerable importance, and that they inclose a copy of the treaty of alliance as ratified by Austria. Through the above channel, intelligence is said to have been received of a battle having been fought on the 29th ultimo, near Nocera, between the Austrians and Murat. The latter, sensible of the imminent danger which threatened him, should the Austrian corps effect a junction in his rear, endeavoured to prevent it. The battle was obstinate and bloody, but the Austrians were victorious, and advanced after the battle. It is probably this battle which is alluded to in the French Papers under the head of Metz, where victory was claimed for the King of Naples, who is reported to have defeated the Austrians, taking from them 8,000 prisoners and 2 pieces of cannon.

We, Observer, stop the Press to give the contents of more Brussels papers just arrived. They make no mention of the battle said to have been fought in Italy.

VIENNA May 7

The Court Gazette of to-day gives a long official report from the army in Italy, dated May 1.—It states, that the enemy, who carefully avoids an action, is vigorously pursued—that Count Niepperg's van-guard reached Bano on the 29th, and advances without stopping; though they destroy all the bridges; and with the cannon of his armed vessels, commands the only road along the seaside. There are reports that the Queen of Naples and suite embarked on the 23d on board of three frigates. The enemy seems to be on the point of abandoning Ancona.

Since our last, we have received the London Journals to the 21st inclusive.

The accounts from the Continent are perfectly uninteresting, no actual change having yet taken place.—The most perfect union of opinion and operation still subsists between the allied powers—Bonaparte has as yet done nothing, except the organization of troops, which is continued.—It appears, that he has completely abandoned the idea of contending with us on the seas, he has ordered a great number of French ships to be dismantled, for the purpose of procuring the cannon for the land service.—The people of France cannot by any means, be considered to be satisfied with the new constitution which is nothing less than a prying inquisitorial police.—The war in Italy may now be looked on as almost concluded—Murat, obliged to fly, his army dispersed, and a powerful force opposed to him, must of course abdicate his crown.—An article from Madrid states, that vast numbers of French emigrants are daily pouring in across the Pyrennees—and that an army is organizing, which bears the name of the French Legion of the South. King Ferdinand has finally declared against Bonaparte—12,000 Spanish troops have been assembled along the line of the Pyrennees.—Two Spanish armies of the reserve are also organizing.

THE ARMY.

The 27th, which landed at Portsmouth but a few days since, embarked again on Friday, very suddenly, and will sail immediately, with the 40th regt. under convoy of the Bermuda, for Ostend.

The 2d bat. of the 4th, stationed at the Tower in London, are under orders for Belgium.

In the House of Lords, on Saturday, the Irish assessed forces bill, the Irish assaults bill, the Irish excise duty bill, and the foreign slave trade bill, were read a first time.

It was notified in the House of Lords and Commons, that a message would be delivered from the Regent, and that at the same time, treaties and subsidiary engagements entered into with the allied powers would be submitted.

Leave was given on Thursday se'night in the House of Commons, on the motion of Lord Castlereagh, to bring in a bill to enable the crown to call out a part or the whole of the militia. In the course of the noble Lord's speech, in introducing his motion, he adverted, unequivocally, to a war with France, as furnishing the cause and the jurisdiction of the measure. The noble Lord stated also, that the understanding and arrangements with the allied sovereigns were completed, and that he hoped on Monday to be authorised to bring down a message from the Prince Regent, which might be taken into consideration on Tuesday, so as to allow the subsidies conventioned by the several treaties to that effect to be moved on Wednesday. Thus the war against Napoleon is not only definitively and irrevocably resolved upon, but on the very eve of commencement. The declaration will probably be issued on Saturday. We trust the consequent operations will be prompt, vigorous, and decisive; and that the result will be such as to ensure a peace equally speedy and permanent.

Some interesting conversation took place on Friday night, in the House of Commons, on the subject of certain public documents, the authenticity of which has been denied or questioned. The charge of forgery affixed by *The Monitor* to the letters, recently cited by Lord Castlereagh, as affecting the case and character of Murat, will, there is reason to think, be fully refuted. Indeed, such a charge comes with a bad grace from the present French government, when we find on that side documents quoted from other sources, but declared and proved to be false. We advert to M. Justus Gruvner's disavowal of a proclamation attributed to him by the *The Monitor*, and commented on as if it had been genuine; and to the disavowal made by Mr. W. Pole the above night of the proclamation given in another French paper as the Duke of Wellington's. There is every reason to believe that the noble Duke has not hitherto issued any proclamation whatever.

The City of Limerick, Way from Liverpool to Maranhham, taken by the Morgiana privateer, and retaken by the Asia man of war, arrived at Bermuda 25th March.
