Wednesday an inquest was held by Francis O'Mara, Esq. Coroner, on the body of Michael Ford, of Crouvahan, farmer, who came by his death in consequence of a dreadful beating he received at the fair of Keadysart, the preceding day; after a number of witnesses being examined, a verdict of wilful murder was returned against some person or persons unknown. Another man was also severely beaten.

We are sorry to learn, that some short time since, in the immediate vicinity of Mountrath, the cow house of James Calcutt, Esq. was maliciously set fire to, and both it and four cows, which it contained, were consumed. We understand a large reward has been offered for the discovery of the perpetrators, and we trust that the magistrates of the Queen's County will step forward and take such measures as may prevent the recurrence of an offence hitherto unknown in that county.

At the fair of Goolden, Thursday se'nnight, there was a very serious disturbance occasioned by an attack which some of the factions who have disturbed the country, made on the Thomas town peasantry, to whose spirited exertions the country is so much indebted. The particulars have been confusedly and contradictorily stated, with more or less of aggravation; but it is certain that two men, of the names of Slattery and Downing, died of their wounds the day after, and there were several others wounded, but none that we have heard of dangerously.

On Sunday night, a party of armed ruffians attacked the house of one Savage, an industrious farmer, living at Parkville, near Clonmel and beat and desperately wounded his wife, son in law, and some others in the house. They had Savage's wife twice on her knees to blow her brains out. The party gave Savage notice to quit the land immediately, under the most severe denunciations. The wounded people, six in number, are under the care of Surgeon Philips, and, we understand, likely to do well.
