

The 21st Regiment, and the remainder of the 85th, arrived on Wednesday at Portsmouth from America.

The Royal Marine Artillery, which was on their march to embark at Portsmouth for a secret service, was suddenly ordered to retrace the way to Woolwich, to embark from thence to the Netherlands. It is said that, as they are more suited to field movements, they are to replace the corps of seamen, as pontoons to the army in the Netherlands.

The Prince Regent's guard mounted on Monday sennight, at St. James's with the points of the colour staffs and the caps of the soldiery, decorated with oak leaves, in honour of the day.

Colonel Lindwick is appointed to the command of the Royal Engineer department, in the South West district.

Great exertions have been used to send off all the disposable military from Portsmouth garrison; so much so, that the usual guards have been so much contracted, that many of the posts round the garrison have no sentinels.

A large detachment of the 75th regiment embarked on board the transport ship Zodiac, at Cowes, last week, and sailed on the 24th, to join their regiment in Sicily. Several detachments also embarked from the same place, in the Centurion transport for Guernsey.

A company of Sappers and Miners landed at Portsmouth on Tuesday, from New Orleans, last from the Havannah. The 1st battalion of the 7th Royal Fusiliers, so long expected is not yet arrived. Two companies of them are embarked in the Norge 74, which is coming home by the way of Jamaica. The remainder of them are in transports coming direct for England.

The Kerry Regiment have been very successful in procuring men; above 400, including the undischarged men are now on the strength of the regiment; and, probably, before the order for embodying is received, their effective strength will be completed; though very particular, both as to the character and appearance of the volunteer, there can be no doubt of a speedy completion, for, exclusive of the wish of our countrymen to enrol themselves in their own corps, the exertions of their embodied Staff have contributed, in no small degree, to the rapid increase of volunteers. — *Kerry E. Post.*

Yesterday, the troops in this garrison, accompanied by the yeomanry brigade, proceeded to the road near the New Barracks where they fired a *feu de joie* in commemoration of the anniversary of his Majesty's birth day, being the 50th of his reign, and the 70th of his age.

Saturday last, Timothy Shaughnessy received his second sentence at Kilmac, in this county, agreeably to sentence, at last assizes, for illegally assembling by night.

More than three years ago, a gentleman in the neighbourhood of Glasgow, put a live toad into a small flower pot, and sunk it two feet in the earth. It was not raised till lately, when the animal was found in as good health as when covered up. The toad was immediately returned to its prison.

A gentleman of his Majesty's ship Spartan, has stated, that a few days back, as a man on board of that ship, at Portsmouth, was going to be punished for stealing a £5 note from one of his shipmates, he declared he was the person that murdered Mrs. Marr and child, and that he never had any peace in his mind since—that there was a gang concerned—that the greater part of them afterwards went to the East Indies—that the rest went for East India soldiers, and that he went into the navy. On its being stated to him, that if his statement was correct, he must be given up to the civil power, but he must first receive his punishment for the crime he had been guilty of on board the ship, he immediately cut his throat, but was prevented from doing it effectually; his wound has since been attended to by the surgeon, and he will be given up to the civil power forthwith. He also says he was concerned in Williamson's affair.
