By the Lord Lieutenant & Council of Ireland: A PROCLAMATION.

## WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS by an act passed in the fifty fifth year of his present Majesty's reign, entitled "An act to repeal an act of the last session of Parliament, for establishing regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this kingdom, or residing therein, in certain cases," it is, amongst other things enacted, that when and so often as the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, shall by proclamation or order of council in Ireland, direct that any Alien or Aliens who may be within the United Kingdom, or who may thereafter arrive therein, shall depart the United Kingdom within a time limited in any such proclamation or order respectively, and any such Alien who shall knowingly and wilfully refuse or neglect to pay due obedience to such proclamation or order respectively, or shall be found in the United Kingdom, or any part thereof, contrary to such proclamation or order, as the case may be, it shall be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, or his or their Chief Secretary, or for any Justice of the Peace, or for any Mayor or Chief Magistrate of any city or place, to cause every such Alien to be arrested, and to be committed to the common goal of the county, or place where he or she shall be so arrested, there to remain without bail or mainprize until he or she shall be taken in charge for the purpose of being sent out of the United Kingdom.

And Whereas it is judged expedient for the public security, to exercise the power so given by the said recited act, in respect to Aliens who arrived in this part of the United Kingdom, since the 1st day of July, 1814.

Now WE, CHARLES VISCOUNT WHITWORTH, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, do hereby order and direct, that all and every Alien or Aliens, who may be within this part of the United Kingdom, and who shall have arrived therein since the first day of July aforesaid, shall depart therefrom within the space of one calendar month from the date hereof, upon pain of being dealt with strictly according to the provisions of the said act.

And it is hereby further ordered and directed, that all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, and other Magistrates, do use their utmost diligence to carry into effect the provisions of the said act of Parliament, as far as they may be concerned.

Given at the Council Chamber in Dublin, the 30th day of May, 1815.
