We received the London Journals of the 29th, and the Paris papers of the 29th and 30th. We have received from the Theatre of the French, the scene of action, most signal defeat, the French having lost 70,000 men. It was also reported that 5,000 prisoners were taken in the battle of Waterloo, and that 2,000 more were expected on the 30th, among whom is Count Lobau, who was killed at the battle of Waterloo, and General Cambrone, who commands the imperial guards—his Grace signifies them all to England.

We recollect the honor of the British army, never did the French army show more zeal never were they so well led as they were at Waterloo. But they have been obliged to submit, not to superior talents, but to the superior talent of a British general, in the person of the Duke of Wellington, who, in the person of our allies, who were the victors, which we had so nobly done, but in justice to the military chieftains who survive, and as a tribute to the heroes, whose lives have been the price of our freedom.
