A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the passent Session of Parliament, entitled, " An Act to so-" thorize under present Circumstances the drawing " out and embodying of the British and Irish Militia, " or any part thereof," it is declared expedient under present Circumstances, in the present Situation of the Country, there being the prospect of an immediate war with France, to authorize the drawing out andembodying the Militia, or any part thereof ; and it is thereby enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Lerd Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Ga. vernors of Ireland for the time being, under the present circumstances, at any time after the passing of the said Act, and before the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixteen, to order and direct that the whole, or any part of the Militia of Ireland, shall be drawn out and embodied in like manner, as the Lord Lientenant, or other Chief Governos or Governors of Ireland for the time being, is by the laws now in force in Treland, empowered of authorised to order and direct, that the said Militia, or any part thereof, or any parts of the Militia of the several Counties in I cland, or any Regiment or Butalion thereof, shall be drawn out and embodied in cases of actual Invation, Rebellion, or Insurrection, or upon immediate danger thereof.

NOW WE, the Lord Lientenant General and C ral Governor of Ireland, under the circumstant verted to in the said recited Act, and in purs the powers thereby vested in us, do, by and advice of a Privy Council, hereby order at that the Militia Forces of Ireland, or such par of as we shall Judge necessary, shall be drawned in pursuance of Warrants; the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief versors of Ireland for the time being at purpose.
