About three o'clock on Monday, a King's messenger arrived at the Post Office, Cork, from whence, with only the delay of changing horses, he immediately departed with great expedition for Bantry, having forwarded despatches to the Admiral at Cove, by Express. Speculation has been busy in applying an object to this mission, and of course the conjectures have been various. Without being able to state beyond doubt, we think we shall be found correct in saying, that the expectation of Bonaparte's attempting to escape from one of the French ports to America, has caused orders to be issued to all King's ships stationed where they may intercept him. We believe the York, 74. Captain Schomberg has been for some time at Bantry, and there were several smaller vessels on this station which all sailed last night.—*Cork S. Reporter.*

**MAGEE V. O'GORMAN.**—This cause, which had excited some interest, came on for trial this day (Monday) before the Chief Justice Downes and a most respectable Special Jury; and after some consideration, it was mutually agreed that the present action, as well as that in which Mr. O'Gorman was Plaintiff against M. Magee, and which was appointed for trial at the next Assizes for the county of Galway, should be left to the award and arbitration of George Lidwell, Esq.—*Dublin Chronicle.*

**Horrid Murder.**—On Sunday se'nnight, as a young woman named Catherine Harris, servant to Mr. Connor, of Carrygrohan, and her fellow servant, a boy, were going home from Cork, they were overtaken by two men, about a mile from town, one of whom took the woman up in his arms and carried her into a bye road, while the other man, with stones, kept the boy from entering, and by threatening to kill him, terrified him so, that he ran away. At day break in the morning, two women discovered the body lying in the middle of the bye road quite dead; her mouth and nose were bloody, her face and neck quite black, and her cap and cloak torn off. An inquest has been held on the body of the unfortunate woman, which brought in a verdict of "wilful murder," against E. Welsh and a person unknown. Walsh, by the exertions of Mr. Connor and some of the constables has been apprehended, and fully committed by the coroner for trial, and there is every hope that his companion will be taken.—*Cork M. Intelligencer.*

On Tuesday, the 20th ult. the trial of two informations, at the prosecution of Mr. W. Speight, inspector of stamps, against Mr. John Flinn, of Fermoy shop keeper; one for a penalty of £5 British, for selling a pack of cards without being stamped, as by law required—the second for a penalty of £20 British, for having in his possession a pack of cards not duly stamped, took place in Fermoy. Both prosecutions were grounded upon the statute of the 52d of the King, Chap. 87. These informations were tried before John Anderson, and David Reid, Esqrs two Justices of the Peace for this county. When, after a full consideration of the case, and hearing evidence, the Magistrates convicted Mr. Flinn in both penalties. Mr. Speight has exerted himself with great activity and success in the detection of frauds on the stamp revenue, in the south of Ireland. We hope this conviction will operate as a caution to retailers against selling cards, without being legally stamped.—*Ibid.*

Late on Thursday night, or early on the morning of Friday last, the residence of Lord Douglas, at Bothwell Castle, was entered into by some robbers. The laundry seemed their object, which they forced, and carried off every thing which was portable, and that to a very considerable extent. Some part of the plunder was discovered in a bundle on the Blantyre side of the Clyde, Scotland, near the priory of that name. An investigation has been set on foot for the detection of the depredators, and it is hoped they will be discovered.
