We also find, that the Corporation of Dublin, voted Colonel Gough the Freedom of that city accompanied with a valuable Sword, with an appropriate inscription;—and his distinguished regiment, the 87th, have presented him an elegant Vasc, with an inscription denoting the different services in which he was engaged at the head of that corps, and demonstrative of the respect which his brother officers entertain for his undanned courage and gentlemanly conduct.

Fines — Yesterday morning, at eleven o'clock, a life broke out in one of the lumber rooms of the White Horse Inn.
