Since the commencement of our Assizes the follow-
 ing persons were tried and convicted in the County

John Ryan for petty larceny, to be confined one month.

John Crowe for the murder of W. Callaghan at Castle
 farm, to be hanged on Thursday 20th inst. and his
 body given to the surgeons for dissection.

John Curtin and John Murphy for a burglary and
 felony in the house of Mary Rea at Red Chair, to
 be hanged.

John Quigilty for a burglary and felony, but having
 been capitally convicted in the city, not brought to
 trial.

Timothy Fraley on several inditelements for burglaries
 and felonies to be hanged.

Michael Barry for unlawfully assembling in arms at
 night, to be imprisoned six months.

John Collins for assaulting a soldier when on duty as
 sentinel, to be imprisoned six months.

Bartholemew Morony, Thomas Morony, and Robert
 Jones, for a riot, to be imprisoned three months.

On Monday last, the Right Hon. Lord Kiltarton, as
 Chamberlain of the Corporation of this city presented

 the French Eagle, which the Colonel captured at Ba-
 rossa, and on the inner part of the Box is the follow-
 ing inscription, beautifully engraved and decorated—
 "From the Corporation of Limerick to their Fellow
 Citizen Lieut. Colonel Hugh Gough, as a mark of the
 estimation in which they hold the eminent services he
 has performed to his Country at the head of the 87th
 Regt. in various battles under the illustrious Duke of
 Wellington and particularly on the 5th of March, 1811,
 at the battle of Barossa, where by his conspicuous in-
 trepidity he gained eternal fame for himself and for
 the gallant Regiment he had the good fortune to com-
 mand."

We also find, that the Corporation of Dublin, voted
 Colonel Gough the Freedom of that city accompanied
 with a valuable Sword, with an appropriate inscrip-
 tion;—and his distinguished regiment, the 87th, have
 presented him an elegant Vase, with an inscription
 denoting the different services in which he was engaged
 at the head of that corps, and demonstrative of the
 respect which his brother officers entertain for his un-
 daunted courage and gentlemanly conduct.

FIRES—Yesterday morning, at eleven o'clock, a fire
 broke out in one of the lumber rooms of the White
 Horse Inn, Cripplegate, where, from the immense
 quantity of goods and inflammable articles deposited,
 not only in that extensive concern, but in the Com-
 mercial Inn adjoining, the most destructive consequen-
 ces were apprehended. For a considerable time the
 flames spread with a alarming and furious rapidity; but
 fortunately two engines, which usually lie in the yard
 of the concern, were put into play, and by the prompt
 arrival of several others, it was extinguished before
 any very serious damage had been done.

A fire happened at Bath on Saturday se'night, which
 was attended with melancholy consequences. It
 occurred at the house of Mr. Diamond, a hair dresser,
 who had retired to bed little more than an hour, when
 about 12 o'clock, he was aroused from his sleep by
 some persons who providentially observed the smoke
 issuing from the lower part of the premises. Mrs.
 Diamond was happily from home. Mr. Diamond
 immediately alarmed his female servant, and then
 rushed into the street, but ventured back again to urge
 her instant escape. The poor creature, however,
 wishing to save her little property, returned to her
 room, and perished in the attempt from suffocation.—
 She slept in an attic, and the staircase being in flames,
 several firemen ascended a ladder to attempt the rescue
 of the unfortunate girl, when the ladder broke, and
 the chief firemen fell from the attic window on the
 pavement, and was killed on the spot. A subscription
 has been set on foot for his widow and eight children.
 The fire was extinguished after destroying the greater
 part of the premises.
