The Ninety-Second Highland regiment.

The following facts which have come to our knowledge respecting this gallant corps, are worthy of particular notice:
Lieut Colonel Erskine, of Cardross, the first commanding officer of this regiment fell gloriously at the head of his brave corps, on the 13th of March, 1801, in Egypt.
Lieut. Colonel Napier, of Blackstone, his successor, fell in the same manner, at Corunna, in Jan. 1809.
Colonel Cameron, of Fassifern, who succeeded Col. Napier, fell at Waterloo, on the 16th ult. in the manner described in the Duke of Wellington's dispatch.
Lieutenant Colonel Mitchell, who then took the command of the Regiment, was soon afterwards wounded, and carried off the field, resigning the command of the battalion to Capt Holmes, the senior officer present, but Captain Holmes had not been long in command when he was also carried off wounded.
Captain Douglas Campbell then took the command, and he was soon after wounded and carried off the field: the command then devolved again on the next senior officer present.
In the afternoon of the 18th ult. the regiment, which was then reduced to about two hundred men, found it actually necessary to charge a column of the enemy which came down on them, from two to 3,000 men. They dashed into the centre of the column with the bayonet, and the instant they pierced it, the Scots Greys dashed in to their support, when they and the 92d cheered and huzzaed, "Scotland for ever!" By the effort which followed, the enemy to a man were put to the sword, or taken prisoners, after which the greys charged through the enemy's second line.
The 14th dragoons and some other cavalry, which were on their march for embarkation at Ramsgate, have been countermanded.
