At a meeting of the Noblemen and Gentlemen of the Co. Tipperary, held in Clonmel, on the 31st ult. it was resolved that a Farming Society be established in that county—a com- mittee has been named to conduct it, and the Earl of Landaff appointed president.

On Sunday night, at an early an hour as ten o'clock, the house of the Rev. Sir Wm. Read, of Tomgrany Glebe, in the county of Clare, Bart. was attacked by an armed mob, who fired shots into his dining room, with an intent to murder him or some of his family; the shots were fired also low a direction as to hit any person sitting at table; but providentially Sir William and some of his fam ly had retired up stairs, and when they heard the shots immediately returned the fire which made the villains run away.—This unwarrant- able attack was made, in consequence of the activity of Sir Wm. Read, as a magistrate, and particularly in bringing to justice a man of the name of James Fitz- gibbon, who was hanged, on Saturday last at Callaghan's Mills in this neighbourhood, for burglary and felony, committed by him. And said Fitzgibbon and party having barbarously inflicted eighteen wounds on the body of Peter Flynn, broke his arm, and with a spade hacked and cut the flesh off the calves of his legs, and then threw him into a pool or dyke of water as dead, but providentially the said Flynn recovered, and pro- secuted to conviction the said Fitzgibbon at the last assizes of Ennis.

The following is a statement of the number of fines for illicit distillation, imposed already on the Connaught circuit at the present Assizes, with the number of persons convicted, for being concerned therein, viz.:—
Co. Roscommon—Forty fines—ten persons convicted.
Leitrim—40 fines imposed on townlands—5 convictions.
Sligo—Forty two fines on townlands—eighteen convictions
Thus in the three Counties above stated, there were 122 still fines imposed, and 33 persons convicted of being concerned in illicit distillation.

By an act passed last session of Parliament, it is enacted, that all foreign produce imported into Great Britain or Ire- land, and re exported from the one to the other, shall pay such import duties in the last port, as if the goods had been originally imported in a foreign ship—unless that in the cocket or clearance of any such foreign goods, when first imported, it shall have been specified whether such goods were imported in a British or foreign ship. Another clause in same act states that it shall be lawful, by order of council or license from a secretary of state, and in Ireland by the Lord Lieute- nant, to permit goods to be imported from any port belong- ing to any kingdom in amity with his Majesty.

Mr. Gilmour, of Moy, near Charlemont, and Mr. Board man, of Dublin, travelling in a gig for Malloy, the latter for his health, was stopped by two desperate ruffians on the 26th ult. at the hour of half past eleven o'clock in the morning, one mile and a half from Naas, and very much abused. One of the banditti snapped a pistol at Mr. Gilmour. After over- powering them, they succeeded in robbing them of post bills of Alexander's bank, amounting to £31, three guinea notes, and bank of Ireland notes for about £20. Boyd v. Edmonds.—This was an action against a young lady, for a poetical libel. The plaintiff was an attorney of Margate, England, the defendant a girl of 20.—It was stated, that the libel was but one among many by which the plaintiff had been assailed for the last twelve months. There were three read in evidence, which, it appeared, had been placarded about the town, and of which duplicates had been sent to the plaintiff. The one related to a suit conducted by the plaintiff respecting a lime kiln, which he had profession- ally prosecuted as a nuisance, and in which he failed. This was a doggerel copy of verses, imputing to him a consultation with the Devil, to remove the kiln, in which attempt he was beaten. This was nailed up on the lamp posts, accompanied by a caricature of the Devil and himself in consultation; but that he was knocked on the head by a winch,—in the carica- ture a bed winch falling on his head. Another represented him and the Devil filling the organ pipes of the church with sand, and a doggerel describing that he did so. A third was a history of his stealing an iron roller. Two witnesses were called to prove the hand writing; after a speech for the defendant, the Jury found the defendant guilty—Damages £10.

SUICIDE.—On Saturday an act of suicide was committed by a domestic of a high official personage, at his residence in the Phoenix Park, Dublin. The unfortunate man effectually perpetrated the deed by cutting his throat with a razor. No cause can be assigned for this rash act. An inquest was held on the body by Mr. Pasley, one of the coroners.
