

30.—When Bonaparte first came on board he was received without the least ceremony, and was turned out for him. Shortly after he went to the Superb, and the next day he went to the Bellerophon, where he was received with a salute, and saluted (but I do not know how) and when he returned to the Belerophon in the same manner. The orders of the Government are to treat him as a General; and none but the Commanders (Lord Keith and Sir H. Duckworth) are on board. I learn that Bonaparte is constantly employed in writing (after breakfast) till four o'clock, and till half past five, occasionally in the numberless boats which are used as they can get; but there is a frigate of the Bellerophon, from which he writes at night, to keep all boats off, which he did at, and said that he should think of going on board a British 74 without being asked. The letter to the Prince is presented to him only by last Thursday's mail, and upon before he left Rochefort, where he got copies of it, from whence it was sent to London. When on deck he is surrounded by the officers and men, and has all of them by one of the General's wives, the Dillons. It was endeavoured to get a courier from him, that he might not be on board the ship, situated as he was, for them, and would not be satisfied every day "Is that he—is that the man who destroyed the human species," is, I am told, high and low. The London Journals to the issue.

From Paris are to the 26th ult. and are as follows.—The contents of the dispatches of the 26th ult. by Mr. Mates, the messenger. Report states, that Soult, and other Generals have been arrested—mission of the army of the Loire to excite suspicion. Macdonald has taken the place of Davoust, who is in Paris to distribute this army in different parts. The treaty for a general peace has been retained by the allies—Prince Napoleon of the Austrian army, has issued orders and soldiers of that army shall not be quartered with the French people, who are now in a state of alarm.—The removal of the works commenced. It is expected that the peace during the trial of Bonaparte's case will be considered as perfectly terminated. The different armies have formed themselves into a constant state of alarm. The army shall have been disembodied, and the peace lately adopted by the King of France into effect, he cannot expect to escape.

The Duke of Wellington has been requested to transmit returns of the subaltern officers to whom these orders may be considered by his Grace to apply; together with accurate muster rolls containing the names of all the "Waterloo Men" in each corps; such muster rolls being to be preserved in this office as a record honorable to the individuals themselves and as documents by which they will at any future time be enabled to establish their claims to the benefits of this regulation.

I have great pleasure in communicating these instances of the Prince Regent's gracious consideration for the army; and I request that you will be pleased to take the earliest opportunity of announcing the same to the officers and men of the corps under your command.

The London papers of Wednesday and Thursday have just come to hand, the following are the most interesting extracts:

Sir Henry Bunbury, the Under Secretary of State for the War Department, and Mr. Bathurst, are arrived in town from their mission to Napoleon Bonaparte.

The Northumberland having required more time to be got ready than was anticipated, did not get away from Portsmouth for Plymouth till yesterday afternoon. She was accompanied by his Majesty's ships Bucephalus, Ceylon, and Morgiana, which, it is said, are all to proceed to St. Helena. Mr. Ibbotson is appointed Assistant Commissary to that Island.

It is high time that this disturber of the world were some way disposed of, for his stay at Plymouth not only deranges and interrupts all regular business, but, we are concerned to add, has been the cause of some serious accidents.
