**ARTS.**—The Northumberland is said to have departed on Friday afternoon, and it was believed that Sir George Cockburn would sail with her that evening or the following morning.—The report is so various and contradictory, that it is impossible to get to almost any one on this subject.—It has been said, we know not what truth, that he said, on being informed of the final determination of our government, to send the Helena, and that he was to be embarked on board the Northumberland for that purpose, that he would never quit the ship alive.—It is reported also, that the regulations will permit him to have but one servant on board—he is to have liberty to consult any physician he may touch at the island.—He will not be suffered to have any communications unless with the Governor's permission.—He is to be attended by an officer and two attendants, who have instructions to shoot him, if he attempts to go beyond their reach.—The French Government will be subject to the expenses necessarily attendant on his confinement.—He shows much dissatisfaction at being only a captured general, and asserts that he is still the French King of Italy, Protector of the Convent of the Rhine &c.—With regard to the report of his intention to destroy himself we do not believe it; for on every occasion, he appeared cheerfully desirous to save his life; if not, why, at the battle of Waterloo which might be considered as his last grand effort, he did not continue the contest, and fall on the field of battle, no!—his cry, on finding that all was lost was "I am pent"—Burdened as his conscience must be for the enormity of his crimes, he will scarcely be the first to attempt the way of suicide.

The 1st bat. of the 5th regiment have left Windsor for the 1st division of the 1st regiment, just embodied, are doing garrison duty at Clonsilla. The 1st regt. under the command of Col. O'Connell, left Clonsilla on the 4th of Jan. and was to be followed by a large force under Gen. Brownrigg, for the purpose of subduing the Canadians—an auxiliary force of 1000 men, sent from Madrid on a requisition from Gen. O'Connell, have gone over to the Canadians. The 1st and 9th regts. of foot are ordered from Gosport to Weymouth, and the latter to Ireland. The 1st battalion of the 53d, at Portsmouth, is ordered to be sent to foreign service. The 1st Gloucester militia and the Worcester militia, are ordered to be sent to Bristol.
