Applications to the Imperial Parliament.

NOTICE is hereby given, that previous to any application to Parliament for any private Bill, for local purposes, notices of the same must be given as follows:—

In cases of Turnpike Roads, three times in the Month of August or September, in one and the same Newspaper, published within each county or place through which the Road runs; and also on the doors of the Sessions Houses of each such county or place, at the Michaelmas Quarter Session, describing the parishes on which the line of road runs. And if to amend or alter any existing Road Act, then any intended increase of toll must be mentioned in every such notice. Also when the application is intended to be made for making any Turnpike Road, or for altering the line of any already made, by widening or diverting the same, a plan of such road or intended alteration, upon the scale of not more than five, nor less than three inches to a mile, must be deposited for public inspection, at the office of the clerk of the peace of every county through which such road is intended to be carried, or such alteration made, on or before the 30th of September next, which map or plan shall describe the line of such intended road or alteration, and the lands through which the same is intended to be carried, and shall be accompanied with a book of reference, containing a list of the names of the owners or reputed owners and occupiers of such lands respectively; and that duplicate of the same be made for the two Houses of Parliament, together with estimates of the expence of such undertaking (in cases where provision is intended to be made for raising money to defray such expence,) such estimates to be signed by the person or persons making the same; and if such money is proposed to be raised by subscription, duplicate accounts of the money subscribed for that purpose, and the names of the subscribers, with the sums subscribed by them respectively; and also estimates of the probable time within which the whole of the work may be completed. Application must also be made to the several owners and occupiers of land through which any road is intended to be carried, or alteration made, and duplicate lists must be made of the names of such owners and occupiers, distinguishing which of them have assented to or dissented from such intended road or alteration, or are neutral in respect thereof, and that the plan must be shown to such owners and occupiers respectively.

In cases of application for bills for paving, cleaning, lighting, or for otherwise improving any city, town, or place, or for erecting and improving Town Halls or market places, or for enclosing, draining, or improving lands, or for making ferries, the like notices as for roads, must be given in the Newspapers and on the Sessions House doors, together with the additional notices in these cases, to be affixed on the several church doors of the several parishes three successive Sundays in August or September.

For making any cut, canal, reservoir, or aqueduct for supplying any place with water; or for making or erecting any bridge, ferry, dock, pier, port, or harbour, all the directions as in the case of turnpike roads with respect to notices, maps, estimates, &c. are applicable, except that the plan in these cases shall also describe the brooks and streams to be diverted into such cut, canal, reservoir, or aqueduct, for supplying any place with water, and contain a plan of such reservoir and the elevation of any such aqueduct; and that such plan shall be accompanied with a section, specifying the level, and describing the same by feet and inches; and that the plans describing the lands through which any such cut, canal, &c. is intended to be carried or from which any such streams of water are intended to be taken, shall also be engraved for the use of the House of Lords, upon the scale of an inch at least to a mile.

The plans, &c. for making or improving bridges, piers, ports, or harbours are not required to be laid with the Clerks of the Peace as in other cases. One set of plans, &c. except those last mentioned, must accompany the Petition to the House of Commons. All Petitions must be presented within fourteen days after the first Friday subsequent to the meeting of Parliament.
