A few nights since the dispensary at Ballagh a village in the Barony of Kilaemannagh, was levelled to the ground—it was supposed to have been the guard house intended for the military who were expected there.

An attack was said to have been made by a band of insurgents, on Monday night last on a party of the military, under the command of Mr. Taylor of Noom, who had received information of a meeting which was intended near Ballinacree. Both parties coming up, Mr. Taylor challenged the banditti which was immediately replied to by a discharge of fire arms, which unfortunately killed the serjeant, who commanded the party, and wounded one of the soldiers—Mr. Taylor then ordered the military to fire, by which, it is supposed that one of the villains must have been killed, or so badly wounded as to be carried off by his comrades.

On Monday last, Mr. Lidwill, accompanied by Mr. Pottier, one of the Members of Parliament for the County of Tipperary, sailed from Dublin for Holyhead. Yesterday, Counsellor O'Connell, Counsellor Bennett, one of Mr. O'Connell's brothers, and Dr. O'Leary, passed through Waterford, for Milford. It is said that all the parties are to meet at Calais on the 20th inst.
