that of intrinsic worth, whose remains were consigned to
earth this morning—I mean Mr. Thacker, whose kindness
and attention to the distresses and welfare of his fellow crea-
tures, would occupy a volume to enumerate His life was
not wasted in idle cabals about sectarians and systems
changeable as the Cameleon hue, or in the foolish ceremonials
of Religion; but in the unwearied pursuit of active benevo-
lence—in feeding the hungry, clothing the naked and in
promoting the instruction of the ignorant poor. He knew no
distinction whatsoever in the objects of his charity, but
bestowed it indiscriminately on all who were in need, sick-
ness, or any other adversity; in fact, he might be compared
to the great Howard, but acting in a narrower circle, and like
him had his death caused by visiting a person in a contagious
distemper.—It is truly gratifying to witness the respect paid
to the obsequies of this estimable individual, as it shews, that
though clouds of folly are daily conspicuous, they have not
as yet obscured the bright rays of virtue.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the
Fifty-fourth Year of his Present Majesty,
entitled, "An Act to provide for the preserving and
restoring of Peace in such parts of Ireland, as may
at any time be disturbed by seditious Persons, or by
Persons entering into unlawful combinations or Con-
spiracies;" it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for
the Justices of the Peace of any County, assembled at
