THE ARMY.

The following letter has been issued from the war office,
and signed Palmerton, addressed to officers commanding
regiments, on account of the property tax :

WAR OFFICE, OCT. 4.

Sir—The instructions contained in my circular letter, dated
23d July, 1814, respecting the sums required to be retained
by regimental paymasters abroad on account of the property
tax, not being now applicable, in consequence of their not
being conformable to the system established by the Lords Com-
missioners of his Majesty's treasury for the practical relations
between the ordinary and extraordinary chests of the armies on
foreign stations—I have submitted the subject to His Royal
Highness the Prince Regent, and his Royal Highness has been pleased to order, in
the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, that from the date
of the receipt of this letter, the following arrangement shall
take place, viz.—The paymaster of the regiment under your
command is to continue to deduct from the estimates, which
he is directed by the 2d article of his instructions to submit
to the commander of the forces upon the station where he is
serving, the amount of the property duty upon the pay of the
regimental officers, which is accordingly to be retained by the
deputy paymaster general; the latter will then give to the
regimental paymaster a certificate of the sum so retained, which
certificate is to be transmitted by the said paymaster to the col-
lector of the property tax of the army, at this office, in order
that he may receive the amount of the sums so certified from
the paymaster general of the forces. I am to add, that the
amount of any bills which may have been drawn upon the
treasury board, under the arrangement notified by my circular
above mentioned, before the present regulation comes into op-
eration, will be transferred by the paymaster general from the
ordinary to the extraordinary funds, except in cases in which
the deputies abroad may actually the transfer of the amount
to the commissariat officer on the spot.

General Sir George Prevost.—The following are the
charges which are to be preferred against General Sir George
Prevost, and which, it is said, have been served on him pre-
paratory to their being investigated by a general court martial.

1.—For having, on or about the 11th day of Sept. 1814, by
holding out the expectation of a co operation of the army
under his command, induced Capt. Downie, late of his Ma-
jesty's ship Confidence, to attack the American squadron on
Lake Champlain, when it was highly imprudent to make such
an attack, without the co-operation from the land forces, and
and for not having afforded that co-operation.

2.—For not having stormed the American works on shore
at nearly the same time that the said naval action began, as he
had given Captain Downie reason to expect.

3.—For having disregarded the signal for co-operation
which had previously been agreed upon.

4.—For not having attacked the enemy on shore, either
during the said naval action or after it was ended, whereby his
Majesty's naval force under the command of Capt. Downie
might have been saved.

Lieutenant General Meyrick, on Monday, returned from the

Detachments of the Cavan regiment have left this garrison

That part of the depot of the 36th regt. which was at Bal-
lincollig, has been ordered to Cork, as also the depot of the
62d regt. preparatory to their being moved to the Isle of
Wight, and are to be relieved by a detachment of the 77th
regt. from Cork.

One company of the Carlow militia has been ordered from
Skibbereen to Bantry, and are to be replaced by a company
of the Limerick city from Kinsale; another company of the
Carlow has been ordered from Bantry to Bere Island.

One company of the 77th regt. now at Fermoy, has been
ordered to join the regt. at Cork.

The 2d gar. bat. arrived from Bermuda. They are quar-
tered at Hilsca.

Saturday last, Serjeant Johnson adjourned the Special Ses-
sions, under the Insurrection Act, from the County Court

were tried, on Tuesday before him, Assistant Barrister Lloyd,
and a full Bench of Magistrates:—

Patrick O'Donnell, of Pallis Kenry, for being absent from
his father's house, on the night of the 5th inst.

Callaghan Riordan, of Rathkeale, and Maurice Roche, of
Callow, for being found drinking in a public house in Rath-
keale, about two o'clock, on Monday morning.

After a most patient trial, they were all convicted as idle
and disorderly persons, and under the Statute were imme-
diately sentenced to be transported for seven years to Botany
Bay, for which place they were sent off this morning under
a strong military escort.

Ireland.
