PROVINCIAL.

CLONMER, Nov. 4 — An adjourned special sessions of the peace under the insurrection act, was holden yesterday in Cashel before the Hon Serjeant Moore, Mr. Moore, the Assistant Barrister, and thirty eight Magistrates, when the trials were proceeded on.

Hennessey, whose case was adjourned from the last Sessions, was acquitted, he having been shie to show that he had reasonable business to the Fair of Goolden and of delay there

There were two other very effecting trials of two women, for concessing and denying arms.—One of them, Margaret Hennessey, was convicted upon the fullest testimony, and after a period of time spent in deliberation, to which nothing appeared to give rise, but strong feelings of humanity for her situation, with a child as her breast, and a number of young children at home. The other woman, Mary Bryan, whose appearance was much above that class to which the spirit of disturbance is thought to be confined, was able fully to exculpate herself by the candid and manly interpretation put upon her conduct by Crosbie Moore, Esq. the prosecutor, and adopted by the bench. There are thirteen more prisoners for trial, and the Court is adjourned to 11 o'clock this day for the purpose of disposing of them.

On Saturdry week, L. H. Jephson, Esq a magistrate of the counties of Tipperary and Waterford, apprehended three men who were drinking in an unlicensed Ale-house, beyond Clonnel bridge, in the county of Waterford, and find them each in the mitigated penalty of ten shillings. As the magistrates, as well as the Public, may not be aware of the powers with which the former are vested by law, we publish the section of the Act of Parliament, which immediately relates to the owners and frequenters of unlicensed Ale houses. We hope that the Magistracy will act wish energy upon this law, which arms them with summary decisive powers, not only for the suppression of a trade prejudicial to the revenue and the interests of the fair dealer, but against meetings for illegal and treasonable purposes, which cannot take place in the licensed retailer's house, except contrary to his solemn onth.

" And he it further enacted that whenever any justice of the peace, or chief or high constable, or any officer appointed by or acting under the commissioners of customs or excise respectively, shall find any person drinking any at liause, shop, store house, or other bailding, or any booth or shed, hur, tent, stall, or place, in which or where any spirituous I quois, wine, beer, ale or porter, cider or perry, methaglin or mead, shall not upon demand be produced to such justice of peace constable, or officer, according to law, it shall and may be lawful for such justice of the peace, constable, or officer, to apprehend all such persons so found drinking there; and every such person so found dracking shall, upon the view of such justice, or upon conviction any just ce of the prace, be subject and liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding twenty shillings, and not less than five shillings, in the discretion of such justice, one moiety thereof to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the poor of the parish, where such conviction shall be paid to the church wardens for the poor of such parish; and in case such penalty shall not be paid by the offender immediately upon conviction, such offender shall be committed to jail by such justice, for any time not exceeding one catendar month, in the discretion of such justice?
