**PROVINCIAL.**

**CLONMEL, Nov. 4** — An adjourned special sessions of the peace under the insurrection act, was holden yesterday in Cashel before the Hon. Serjeant Moore, Mr. Moore, the Assistant Barrister, and thirty eight Magistrates, when the trials were proceeded on.

Hennessey, whose case was adjourned from the last Sessions, was acquitted, he having been able to shew that he had reasonable business to the Fair of Goolden and of delay there.

There were two other very affecting trials of two women, for concealing and denying arms. — One of them, Margaret Hennessey, was convicted upon the fullest testimony, and after a period of time spent in deliberation, to which nothing appeared to give rise, but strong feelings of humanity for her situation, with a child as her breast, and a number of young children at home. The other woman, Mary Bryan, whose appearance was much above that class to which the spirit of disturbance is thought to be confined, was able fully to exculpate herself by the candid and manly interpretation put upon her conduct by Crosbie Moore, Esq. the prosecutor, and adopted by the bench. There are thirteen more prisoners for trial, and the Court is adjourned to 11 o'clock this day for the purpose of disposing of them.

On Saturday week, L. H. Johnson, Esq. a magistrate of the counties of Tipperary and Waterford, apprehended three men who were drinking in an unlicensed Ale-house, beyond Clonmel bridge, in the county of Waterford, and find them each in the mitigated penalty of ten shillings. As the magistrates, as well as the Public, may not be aware of the powers with which the former are vested by law, we publish the section of the Act of Parliament, which immediately relates to the owners and frequenters of unlicensed Ale houses. We hope that the Magistracy will act with energy upon this law, which arms them with summary decisive powers, not only for the suppression of a trade prejudicial to the revenue and the interests of the fair dealer, but against meetings for illegal and treasonable purposes, which cannot take place in the licensed retailer's house, except contrary to his solemn oath.

“ And be it further enacted that whenever any justice of the peace, or chief or high constable, or any officer appointed by or acting under the commissioners of customs or excise respectively, shall find any person drinking any at house, shop, store house, or other building, or any booth or shed, hut, tent, stall, or place, in which or where any spirituous liquors, wine, beer, ale or porter, cider or perry, methaglin or mead, shall not upon demand be produced to such justice of peace constable, or officer, according to law, it shall and may be lawful for such justice of the peace, constable, or officer, to apprehend all such persons so found drinking there; and every such person so found drinking shall, upon the view of such justice, or upon conviction any justice of the peace, be subject and liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding twenty shillings, and not less than five shillings, in the discretion of such justice, one moiety thereof to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the poor of the parish, where such conviction shall be paid to the church wardens for the poor of such parish; and in case such penalty shall not be paid by the offender immediately upon conviction, such offender shall be committed to jail by such justice, for any time not exceeding one calendar month, in the discretion of such justice.”

About noon day on Thursday last, Maurice Ronayne, of Harbourview, in the county of Waterford, Esq. was attacked by four armed men on the mountain road between Dungarvan and Clashmore, and robbed of fifty six guineas. On Mr. Ronayne's application, Richard Power, of Clashmore, Esq. and some other Gentlemen, immediately went in pursuit of the robbers, and traced them to Ballintaylor hills, where they unfortunately secured their safety.

On Wednesday se'night, John Weckes, Esq. Coroner, held an inquest on the body of John Hely, of Moybella, county Kerry, who it appeared fell in one of those party conflicts which disgrace many parts of that county — On the deposition of one witness named Patrick Barrett, the Jury found as follows: — “ We find, that the deceased came by his death in a riot, and that he died in consequence of wounds and bruises he received from Mat. Quin, Gar. Sullivan, and Pat. Scalan, assisted by others unknown to us.”

Yesterday se'night, the said officer held an inquest at Knockane, in that county, on the body of John Molony — Verdict: “ We find, that the said John Molony came by his death in consequence of a stroke of a stone which he received in his chest by some person unknown.”

On Thursday se'night, Frans. Twiss Esq. a Magistrate of the county Kerry, accompanied by Mr. Thomas Miles and a few soldiers of the Antrim Militia, quartered at Castle-Island went in search of Daniel Kearney, a noted offender who had the absolute command of a banditti of ruffians, and who, for the last two years committed a variety of burglaries in different parts of the county. Having received information that this unfortunate wretch frequented a certain house in the neighbourhood of Miltown, he, with his party, pro-
