

Mails from Holland and Brussels arrived last night. A Brussels Paper of the 11th states, that orders were received there on the 8th, to prepare accommodations and necessaries for a Prussian army of 70,000 men and 30,000 horses, coming the 1st and 6th corps of the Prussian army, which were to march through there on their return from France.

All the necessary measures were taken, when they arrived, that, upon the French frontiers, orders had been received for the Prussian army to march, and go into cantonments till further orders. The Prussian troops have consequently spread themselves along the French frontiers, even to the neighbourhood of Lille, which causes no small uneasiness in that city. It is remarked, that since the time the duty of the French fortresses, Conde, Valenciennes, and Bouchain, is again performed with the greatest strictness."

The French fortresses were to be delivered up to the Allies this day (20th November.) The Trial of Ney was expected to commence on Friday. He was to be removed previously to the Conciergerie to the Luxembourg, where the Peers hold their sittings.

Whether it be the fermentation produced by this success, or the increased activity and plots of the separatists, who are said by the Prime Minister to be overjoyed at the decision of the Council of War.—Whether it be any reluctance on the part of the French Government to fulfil some stipulations with the Allies, we know not; but we observe that the number of foreign troops at Paris increased, particularly of Austrians.

SINGULAR INSTANCE OF SWINDLING.

A fellow of the name, or assumed name, of Samuel Blitham, came to Limerick about two years ago, and set up the business of a watchmaker, in Brick-street.—As persons are frequently apt to trust the abilities of strangers even beyond their value, so it happened in this instance, and he got into the confidence of many of the principal inhabitants, whom he prevailed upon, by an affectation of disinterested off-handedness, to commit the most valuable watches and time-pieces to his care and management.—Thus, having acquired in these articles, a property of upwards of three thousand pounds, he, on Saturday night last, or early on Sunday morning took his departure, leaving his wife to follow with the swindled and valuable property. By the activity of Alderman Wilkinson, who followed the fugitives with the utmost expedition, he came up with the wife on Tuesday when she was coming out of the Canal Boat and having dogged her to a house in Abbey-street, he took from her one hundred and eighty four valuable Watches, Clocks, &c. &c. &c. which he deposited in the Bank of Ireland to be claimed by the respective owners.—We are sorry to say that the Male Swindler has hitherto escaped Justice, but we trust he will shortly meet the fate he so justly merits.

Yesterday morning, Dr. Bell, of the 84th Regiment, quarantined in this City, was found dead in his room at the New Mills—this unhappy man put a period to his existence in the following horrible manner:—he first cut his throat and then with his sword, after which he inflicted a deep wound on his side with a surgical instrument called a Bistoury, which produced the desired effect.—He had for several days previous to the commission of this dread act, shewed symptoms of melancholy.—An Inquest was yesterday holden on the body, before the Right Worshipful Mayor, when a verdict of "Insanity" was returned.
