A PROCLAMATION. WITHWORTH.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Pilty-fourth Year of his Present Majenty; entitled, " As Act to provide for the preserving and " restoring of Peace in such parts of Ireland, as may " at any time be disturbed by seditions Persons, or by " Personsentering rate unlawful Combinations or Can-" spiracies;" it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Justices of the Peace of any County, assembled at an extraordinary Session of the Peace summaned in Manner by the said Act directed, and pursuant to the Provisions therein contained, not being fewer than Seven, in a county at large, or the major Part of them, if they see fit upon due consideration of the State of the County, to signify by Memorial by them signed to
