**THE INCOME TAX.**—The following document, relat-  
ing to the subject of the Income Tax, may afford our Rea-  
ders some satisfactory information. Charles Taylor, Esq.  
M. P. of Hollycomb, near Liphook, let a farm from  
Michaelmas, 1814, and in the month of April following,  
the tenant being insolvent, he was obliged to take back his  
farm, without any rent, and in so bad a state, that the pro-  
duce to Michaelmas, 1815, would not pay the labourer,  
and taxes, yet both landlord and tenants taxes were  
demanded of him for the rent it was assessed at.—The ques-  
tion naturally asked of the Government was—Will the da-  
mand be enforced in the Court of Exchequer?—to this case,  
which is likely to prove not an uncommon one, the follow-  
ing reply was made by the Chancellor of the Exchequer:

(Copy) "Downing-street, Nov. 27, 1815.

"SIR—Having received from various quarters represen-  
tations respecting the property tax chargeable on land, in  
cases where a reduction has been taken place in the rent, I  
have delayed replying to the letter which I had the honor  
of receiving from you, on the 11th ult. until the subject had  
undergone a full consideration.

"I have now the satisfaction of informing you, that  
instructions have been lately given to the Board of Taxes,  
which, it is hoped, will be found effectual for removing  
any reasonable ground of complaint upon this point.—I  
have the honour, &c.

The instructions given to the Board of Taxes, mentioned  
in the Chancellor of the Exchequer's letter, we presume,  
are those which authorize District Commissioners to reduce  
the Assessments, under certain conditions, upon appeals

### War of the European Powers against the Barbary Pirates.

This morning a Mail arrived from Hamburgh. On the  
29th ult. a train of a 100 waggons, containing the works of  
art which the French had carried off from Austria, arrived at  
Ratisbon under a proper escort.

But the most important article brought by this Mail is that  
contained in a letter from Rome, by which we learn that a  
general league has been formed among the European Powers  
to put an end to the white slave trade, the depredations of  
the Algerines.

Journals of Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday—  
Those of Thursday have not come to hand.

By the above we are supplied with accounts from  
Paris to the 9th—Their contents are peculiarly in-  
teresting, and the extracts we have made will be  
found to be very ample—The trial of Ney came  
on in the Chamber of Peers on the 4th Instant,  
and continued on the 5th, and 6th, when he was  
found guilty of High Treason, and an attempt  
against the safety of the State—he was found guilty,  
and sentenced to be shot, which was put into ex-  
ecution the following day. Lavalette's appeal was  
not to be heard until the 14th.

On the 11th Inst. His Royal Highness the Prince Regent  
was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty,  
to confer the honour of Knight-hood upon Benjamin Bloom-  
field, Esq. Major-General in the army, Clerk-Marshal,  
and Chief Equerry to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent,  
and one of the Representatives in Parliament for Plymouth.

It is now understood that Government have determi-  
ned not to re-establish the signal-stations, as was intended  
some time since, to interrupt the smuggling trade, instead of

is 120, with four of artillery, and are stationed as follow,

31; Woolwich, 24; with one company of artillery to  
each. A great number of all ranks of Officers in the above-  
meritorious corps have in consequence been placed on the re-  
tired list.
