crimes, effectually dissolved, and unfeignedly abandoned.

And the Magistrates of the Barony of Clanwilliam, upon whom, as placed in more immediate vicinity to the scene of the late most atrocious outrage, the duty of resisting, by the strong arm of the law, that desperate spirit of violence and assassination, would seem to have been thrown in the first instance, and in a special degree; and which, the aid, to be afforded by a more distant co-operation, must, of necessity, be comparatively weak and ineffcient, having declared themselves and the ordinary powers of the Magistracy entirely incompetent to undertake so deep a responsibility; and having called for the strong interposition of his Majesty's Govern ment, and the extension to their particular district of the provisions of the Act of the 54th year of the King, cap. 13, entitled, an Act for the better execution of the laws in Ireland, by appointing superintending Magistrates and additional constables in counties in certain cases We, the Justice of the Peace, of the county of Tipperary,

here in Special Sessions assembled, think it our duty, under the peculiar circumstances herein before recited, unanimously to submit it to your Exellency, as our opinion and humble recommendation, that the provisions of the said Act may be extended accordingly to the said Barony of Clanwilliam.

Confiding in your Excellency's administration, for a perseverance in the same wise and equitable principle, which in he selection of he persons already made for carrying these atraordinary powers into effect, has so effectually protected he Government, not less than the Magistrates themselves gainst the imputation of those unworthy motives, of an undue ttention to patronage on the one hand, and self interest on he other.

his Excellency desires me to assure the Magistrates, that y energy of the Executive Government shall continue to pplied in aid of their personal exertions; and should the sures at present in operation, prove inadequate, he will hrink from the responsibility of resorting to such others. igent necessity may call for and justify.

is Excellency has directed immediate steps to be taken, epplying to the Barony of Clanwilliam, rovisions of the Act which the Magistrates have recomled to be enforced; and they may be assured, that in ting the instruments for carrying it into execution. His llency will act upon the principle upon which he has rto acted-and consider their efficiency, their strongest heir sole recommendation.
