We copy the following from one of the Dublin papers  
of Monday:

**SUICIDE**—On the day before yesterday, Sir Edward  
Crofton, Bart. walked out to a plantation not far distant

also at his head—he lived for a short time and then expired

**SUICIDE**—On Monday, an Inquest was held at Brown-  
ville, before Charles Jacob and John Harvey, Esq. on view  
of the body of Lieut. William Browne, of the Royal Navy,  
aged 60 years, who put a period to his existence the night  
before. After a patient investigation of several witnesses, the  
Jury returned a verdict—"That the deceased had fired a  
pistol, loaded with balls, through his head, which caused  
instant death, and that the unfortunate act was owing to  
mental derangement."—*Wexford Herald*
