ten must be shewn. This objection being over-ruled—
 Mr. Serjeant Best said, he should feel himself bound to
 have this rule of evidence settled by a Court of Law, and
 intimated his intention of moving the Court upon this point
 if he was dissatisfied with the verdict.

The plaintiff's Counsel then rested their case upon a letter
 written by defendant after he had eloped with Mrs. Ruddall,
 to Captain Thomas Dunbar, her brother, which was to the
 effect following:—

SIR—From your sister's letter, Lady Dunbar has been led
 to expect some further communications which will account
 for her sudden disappearance. This task devolves upon me.
 I wish it was in my power to convey more grateful intelli-
 gence, or that our union could have taken place under more
 favourable circumstances. But I feel it a duty which I owe
 to your family to inform you that your sister is living with
 me in the character of my wife. This letter is intended to
 relieve you all from the painful state of suspense which you
 must have hitherto experienced. I do not attempt to defend
 my conduct. I have acted under the influence of an attach-
 ment which I found it totally impossible to subdue; but
 which, unfortunately, was too sincerely returned. My mo-
 tives are not depraved. The lady who possesses the warm
 affections of my heart, I am in hopes will become my wife.
 You may be sure she has fallen into the power of a man who
 will devote his whole life to her service, and who will al-
 ways treat her with the highest degree of tenderness and affec-
 tion. I do most truly regret that the violence of my feelings
 and the peculiarity of your sister's situation, have forced me
 to act thus towards your family. I am &c. P. S. Letters

 agents, Messrs Aldridge & Colly Smith, Lincoln's Inn, will
 be forwarded.

The plaintiff's case rested mainly upon this letter.

Mr. Espinasse addressed the Jury in mitigation of damages,

The Rev. William Massy, a Magistrate of the Co. Tippe-
 rary, and this County, lodged in Clonmel Jail, on Tuesday

 five for trial, charged with the murder of that esteemed and
 lamented Gentleman.

To-morrow, Adw. Hehir and Patrick Molony, convicted
 at the last General Quarter Sessions for this city, of a riot and
 assault, are to be flogged from Thomond Gate to Wightfield.

The young gentleman who had been missing since Sunday
 se'night, whose friends offered a reward for information
 respecting him, was on Wednesday evening found drowned
 in the Royal Canal, at the Broad-Stone—his gold watch,
 which was a very valuable double-cased one, to which were
 attached a strong gold curb chain, three gold seals, and two
 gold keys, was found in his inside pocket: his money was
 also found on his person. He left Blackhall-street at a
 quarter before ten o'clock on the above night, and went thence
 to Palace-row, and was on his return homeward a quarter
 before eleven o'clock, from which period no trace whatever
 of him could be had until the body was discovered.

On Monday morning last three desperate ruffians were
 apprehended at Manham, County of Kildare, in the very
 act of robbing. They robbed a poor man of his watch and
 £6 in money; they then came to the house of a widow
 Byrne, who sells spirits, and after having drank a pint of
 whiskey, they became determined to rob three men who
 were within the house drinking; fortunately the robbers
 were overpowered by the men, but by some fatality two of
 the villains got off; the other was lodged in Naas goal to
 abide his trial. They were armed with a blunderbuss,
 fowling-piece, and a case of pistols.

There was recently living in Constantinople a very
 extraordinary man, upwards of 100 years of age, generally
 known under the name of "Soliman, the eater of sublimate."
 This man, when young, accustomed himself, as the Turks
 do, to swallow opium; but having taken by degrees a large
 quantity, without producing the desired effect, he adopted
 the use of sublimate, and for upwards of thirty years has
 taken a drachm or sixty grains a day. He would sometimes
 go to the shop of a Turkish Jew, and call for a drachm of
 sublimate, which he mixed in a glass of water, and drank it
 up immediately. The first time the apothecary was very
 much alarmed, for fear he should be charged with poisoning
 the Turk; but he was struck with amazement when he saw
 the same man again, on the next day, who called for another
 dose. Lord Elgin, Mr. Smith and several Gentlemen now
 in England, have met this extraordinary man, and have heard
 him say that the sensation he experienced after having drank
 that extremely active poison, was the most delicious he ever
 enjoyed. Such is the force of habit! It is generally thought
 that since the days of Mithridates, no one had ever made
 constant use of such a substance.
