LATE FRACAS AT BATH.—It will be easily remembered that some weeks ago a fracas took place at the Bath Theatre, in which two Gentlemen, of the names of B—t and B—y had behaved in a manner somewhat indecorous in a box at the Theatre, near to which Admiral M—s and Capt. M—d were seated. In consequence of letters which then passed on the subject an adjustment of the business then took place, of which an account was published by Capt M—d, wherein a Mr. E. (a friend of the two Gentlemen above mentioned) was stated to have made an apology in their behalf. Mr. E. happened to leave Bath immediately afterwards, and on Capt. M—d's statement appearing in the papers, Messrs B—t and B—y denied the correctness of it, and requested the public to suspend their opinion on the subject till Mr. E. returned to Bath. Mr. E. returned to Bath about ten days ago, and on being appealed to, gave a decision in favour of Capt. M—d's statement. Mr. B—t on this, sent Mr. E. a message, which Mr. E. on consideration of all the circumstances of the case, thought proper to decline. Mr. B—t, therefore, went to the Pump-room the next morning with a horse-whip or stick in his hand, and there meeting Mr. E. he either shook it over his head or struck him, which was immediately answered by Mr. E. knocking his assailant down. A battle consequently ensued, in the course of which both the parties were somewhat bruized, and the harmony of the beaux and belles completely put to the rout for that morning's promenade. What may be the further issue of this affair, our informant is not able even to guess at.

David Kelly, and Charles Daly, were committed to Newgate from the Head Police Office, Dublin, on Thursday last, for stealing, on Sunday, the 19th inst from Wm. Poole and George Trannon, Esqrs. Students of Trinity College, to whom they had been servants, a variety of articles of wearing apparel, and a gold watch.

About a fortnight ago, the house of Mr James Walsh, an opulent farmer of Ballybrusa, near Ardmore, county of Waterford, was attacked by four armed men, who entered his house. Welsh with great spirit knocked one of them down, and was well seconded by Mr. Hassett, his uncle, who secured another; the other two ran off. The next morning Welsh came down to the barrack of Ardmore, and took some soldiers with him, who brought them to Ardmore, and they were immediately committed to gaol by Edmund Barrett, Esq. Their names are James Dee and James Dower.—Some of the neighbouring houses had already been robbed on that night. The next night the military searched several houses in pursuit of the rest of the gang, but did not find any of them. Too much praise cannot be given to those spirited farmers, Welsh and Hassett, whose resolute conduct shows what defence honest industry and determined courage can make against lawless outrage.

SINGULAR DISCOVERY.—On the first instant Mr. Henry St. Laurence, Revenue Officer, of the Boyle walk, assisted by Fred. Hanly, and Mr. James St. Laurence, Assistants, and a party of the Sligo militia, discovered, by information, an unlicensed distillery at Moygara, in the county of Sligo. (The proprietor being a very respectable farmer, of the name of O'Grady). The manner which this truly curious distillery was situated has astonished many people. The officers and their party having found way to the concealments by digging up the parlour floor which led to a small passage not more than fourteen inches in circumference, and on getting into it, discovered the distillery, consisting of a large copper still-head and worm, and a considerable quantity of pot ale, vessels, &c. &c. —This distillery has been for thirty years distilling spirits, and never till that day discovered, nay, even O'Grady's next door neighbours did not know of it till the seizure was passing their doors. The sneak of it was very ingeniously conveyed into the parlour chimney, the fire of which was at all times kept down while the fire was under the still, in order to cause no remark to be made on the smoke from that part of the house. This spot was also near three years between contriving and building, and every utensil was put together in it; in consequence of which the officer had got down part of the wall to remove the utensils, &c. &c.
