 that the Legislature, will, in their wisdom, do some thing in
 order to wrest from impending ruin, this great root of our
 national Prosperity.

ATROCIOUS OUTRAGE.

We are shocked, even to sickness, on reading
 the following, which we extract from a Belfast
 paper of Friday:

"We never had occasion to record a more atrocious out-
 rage than what occurred in this town on the morning of Wed-
 nesday last—About four o'clock, a band of armed ruffians,
 attacked the dwelling house of Mr Francis Johnson muslin
 manufacturer, near the head of North-street, while the family
 were all asleep, and this family consisted of Mr. and Mrs.
 Johnson, eight children, two maid servants, and one servant
 man. The banditti began their operations by forcibly break-
 ing off the shutters of the parlour window, which were
 sheathed with iron; having effected this they raised the lower
 sash, and, horrible to relate, they then introduced a large box
 filled with pitch, tar, hemp, and other inflammable materials,
 and, to render their diabolical design still more surely and
 direfully destructive, they had attached to these inflammable
 substances a large ball or bomb shell filled with gun powder
 and other combustibles communicating with which was a
 fuze, to which they set fire; and having thus deposited their
 infernal machine, they retreated to a short distance to witness
 the completion of the diabolical conspiracy, which, they
 expected, should, in one awful moment, consign to destruc-
 tion this numerous and happy family. Providence, how-
 ever, interposed at this fearful crisis, and defeated their
 malignity. The servant man was awake by their operations,
 and seized a pitchfork, being the first weapon he could find,
 he ran to the parlour, at the same time calling to alarm the
 family. When he entered the room he perceived the ball and
 flaming fuze, and, in the momentary confusion, not knowing
 what it was, he dashed at it with the pitchfork, and the prongs
 having stuck into it, he drew it towards him, and retreated
 with it to the kitchen. In the midst of the agitation which
 this unaccountable circumstance produced, he, for a moment,
 abandoned the pitchfork and the flaming ball, to call to his
 master up stairs. Gracious Heaven! in two seconds the
 combustibles exploded like a clap of thunder, and rent the
 house from top to bottom. Not a wall but was shattered;
 the windows were blown to pieces, and a back door of the
 kitchen fortunately burst open which gave vent to the fury
 of the explosion.

"When Mr. Johnson was first alarmed by the servant, he
 immediately started out of bed, and laying hold of a blunder-
 buss, which was ready loaded, he went to a front window
 which he opened, and perceiving eight or ten of the ruffians
 at some distance, he fired among them; but he had scarcely
 done so, when the explosion took place in the kitchen, and
 threw his family into the utmost state of consternation. The
 servants on hearing the report, returned again to the front of
 the house, and commenced an attack with fire arms, upon
 which Mr. Johnson having one loaded pistol, fired it at them.
 By this time the neighbouring families, being alarmed by the
 explosion and the firing, were coming into the street, upon
 which the banditti ran off in different directions, and, owing
 to the darkness of the night, effected their escape.

"After the recital of this dreadful affray, it will relieve the
 minds of our readers to be informed, that not one of Mr.
 Johnson's family received the smallest injury, excepting the
 agitation into which they were thrown by the dreadful oc-
 currences in the course of the tremendous conflict.

"We cannot close this account without stating, that the
 nightly patrol, which was lately established in this town, had,
 in going their rounds, passed Mr. Johnson's house not half an
 hour before the attack was made on it; and on hearing the
 explosion, which was the first signal of alarm, they instantly
 repaired there, and though the banditti had, by that time,
 escaped, yet the presence of the patrol was a very comfortable
 circumstance to the family, under their then state of alarm."

On Thursday, a meeting of the inhabitants of Belfast, was
 held, when resolutions were passed, offering a reward of
 £2000 for a discovery of the nefarious offenders,
