On the evening of Monday se'night, the American ship Melantho, Captain Purkins, struck on a ledge of sunken rocks between Hogshead and Mutton Island, and most melancholy to relate, the entire crew 17 in number, with the master's lady perished—her main-mast first went overboard, and the ship shortly after went to pieces. Some of the provisions and butter were washed on shore. The Melantho sailed from this for Barcelona on Saturday with a cargo of barley, which was insured—Several pieces of her timber were washed on shore at Miltown.

The following letter from China, of a very recent date will be found to obtain several interesting occurrences from that quarter:—

“ H. M. S. Alpheus, Bocca Tigris, November 4.

“ All is quiet with the Chinese. We have just returned from a second trip to the Manilla, whither we went to obtain a freight of dollars, either for China or Bengal. We pro- cured ten tons altogether. Had not a decree existed, prohi- biting any further exportation of specie for the present, we should have obtained a much larger amount; for there is a very considerable quantity at the disposal of the government at Manilla. We took over Messrs. Pattle and Fraser, of the Select Committee of the Factory.”

“ A galcon arrived there, in July, with three millions and a half of specie; and the Vittoria is expected from America in January, with as much more, when the reasons for the prohibition will have ceased. The Leda, Captain Sayer, left Manilla on the 15th of October, with silver bars to the amount of 200,000 dollars, for Bengal; and the Revolution- naire, Captain Woolcombe, on the 24th of August, with bars for Bengal, value 100,000 dollars.

“ The Owen Glendour, Captain Hodgson, is collecting the first fleet for England, which is to sail hence in the next month.”
