**Further particulars of the loss of the Meluntho.**  
[Extract of a Letter from Miltown Malbay]  
"This moment I received your letter and hasten to communicate any information I know concerning the loss of the Meluntho. She appeared off our coast on the morning of Monday, and kept beating about on it till dusk, when she could not be seen any more, as the night came on immediately, and very dark—it blew an amazing storm and we suppose she lay embayed and could not clear the neck of land outside Mutton Island. The morning after, our shore was covered with wrack but scarce any thing of consequence. She must have been beat to pieces as all her under works such as her knees, her beams, &c. were thrown into us, with some hogheads and other small vessels, her paint pots and even the Captain's shoe brushes. On the land adjoining ours, 3 pigs, a goat, a box of sailors' apparel, some red baize shirts, and the caps the poor people wore, the figure of a woman and some other things of no importance. The small boat came in on Mr. Dalton's land, it is not painted nor has it any name; part of the mast was driven in on Mr. Carroll's ground. She must have been loaded with barley as the coast is covered with it. Should any of the bodies come on shore, which is more than probable, they shall get Christian burial and be shown every decency possible. If any thing transpire concerning her or any part of her crew as you seem interested I will give you the earliest information."
