Soon after this short conversation had taken place, and while Mr. Justice Fletcher was going through the county presentations—one of Mr. Martin's (as a contractor for keeping in repair, a line of road in Conamara,) was read.

Justice Fletcher immediately said he "did not suppose that there were any roads in Conamara."

Mr. Martin replied, "My Lord, when the sum presented by us (the Grand Jury) shall be expended, I solicit of your Lordship to send your Carriage and Horses and Servants to travel the whole line. All of them shall be well accommodated and hospitably entertained, provided that your Lordship SHALL NOT ACCOMPANY THEM."
