DESCRIPTION OF THE PERSON NAMED IN

At Clonmel Assizes on Wednesday, John Wurnene was tried under several indictments for robbing the mail from Fethard and Cashel to Clonmel and Dublin, as the hill of Ardgeeha, near Clonmel, on the 24th of Jan. 1815-and also for again robbing the said mail at same place on the 30th Jan. following -and for having in his possession, in this county, Bank of Ireland post bills stolen out of said mails, knowing the same to have been stolen. The several indictments were capital .-After the jury had retired to consider of their verdict, Mr. Scott, one of the Crown Lawyers, employed on the prosecution, addressed the bench, observing, that if the prisoner was acquitted of that part of the indictment with the actual robbery of the mails, it would be incorrect to convict him on the other indictment, as the notes were not found in his possession in this county, and he could be indicted on that fact in the county where the offence occurred. The jury were thereupon called up-the circumstance was stated to them from the beach, and they acquitted the prisoner on both indictments He was ordered to be transmitted to Cork for trial, and sent off for that destination the next day (Thursday ) . The offence
