protection of Saving Banks. This is a wise measure, and can hardly fail to prove highly conducive to the prosperity of these institutions.

The Kilkenny Savings' Bank opened for the first time at eight o'clock last Monday morning. It closed at ten, and in the two hours it received deposits from labourers, servants and journeymen to the amount of upwards of £45.

The Rev. Charles Townley, L. L. D. from London, has arrived in this city, and purposes preaching in the New County Court House on Sunday next.

It is in contemplation to impose a duty of £10 per last, about 10 shillings per barrel, on foreign rapeseed. This measure will be highly beneficial to Ireland.

Soap, within the last week, has advanced £8 a ton through- out England, in consequence of the increased duty intended to be imposed of 28s. a cwt. instead of 21—It is proposed to put a duty of 3d. a lb. upon all soap imported from Ireland to England, and 1d. a lb. from England to Ireland.

Monday se'nnight in consequence of the advance in the price of Bread, several groups of manufacturing poor, assembled at different parts of Bridport, complaining of the grievance, added to their want of employment from the present stagnation of trade. Their numbers increasing, one of the most active bore a quarter loaf through the streets a pole. This drew together a great number of men, women, and children, who soon proceeded to acts of violence, demolishing the windows of the principal millers and bakers, and taking from the brewery of Messrs. Gundry three hogsheads of porter, which they drew in triumph to the centre of the town. The Riot Act was then read, but several hundreds more having joined the mob it was evident that nothing but the most prompt measures could prevent the dangerous consequences likely to follow, and which were happily prevented by the exertions of some of the principal inhabitants who rushed among the mob, destroyed the beer, seized the ring-leaders, and in a very short time dispersed upwards of 2000. committing the former to prison.—*Bath Chronicle*
