We have received since our last, the London Papers of Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, together with French Prints to the 23d inst. inclusive.

The Parisian Journals are entirely devoid of interest. Some few arrests continue, but nothing of importance has taken place.

The riots in the disturbed counties in England have been suppressed by the prompt interference of the Government. A proclamation has been published by order of the Prince Regent, offering a reward of One Hundred Pounds for the apprehension of any of those concerned in the outrages committed in the different disturbed counties.

The debates in Parliament for the last week have been highly interesting and important to the Irish people—The principal subjects were—The Consolidation of the English and Irish Exchequers—Tythe Laws—English and Irish Catholic Question—of which we present to our readers the most copious reports.

A private letter from Paris is extremely important. The conspiracy which displayed itself in glaring colours at Grenoble is said to have been intended to operate all over France; and that circumstances shew three of Bonaparte's chief instruments (lately pretended Bourbonists) were connected with it.

Arrests of the disaffected still continue in various parts of France. A General Chartran has been shot at Lille, in pursuance of his sentence, for joining Bonaparte. This miserable victim of the times would have been pardoned, we presume, but for the recent disturbances at Grenoble.

We are sorry to have it to state that the system of midnight depredation seems to be again breaking out in the neighbourhood of this city—on the night of Saturday last, some fellows made an attempt upon a farm house belonging to the Rev. Mr. Harle at Ballynantibeg, but retired without effecting anything. On the Monday night afterwards, however, the same party it is supposed, consisting of three persons, returned, and forced open the house door—they then broke open a bed chamber door and searched every part of the house for the purpose as they said of looking for arms, but not succeeding in that they carried off what money they could find, fortunately to a small amount, with which they made off.

A few nights ago a man of the name of John Cullane, a pensioner and Gate Keeper to George Massy of Glanwilliam, Esq. in this county, who some times since exhibited symptoms of insanity—after returning from Limerick where he had been to receive his pension, murdered his wife, by beating out her brains with a hammer—after which he picked out her eyes with an awl—he then endeavoured to set the porter's lodge on fire, (his own habitation) without effect, when he concluded this dreadful catastrophe, by cutting his throat.

A memorial has been presented to the Lord Lieutenant by Messrs. Daniel and Stephen Egan, of Roscrea, complaining of the various privations they suffered in consequence of their arrest and subsequent imprisonment, on a false charge of conspiracy and murder. The memorial further states, that the prosecutor Dyer, an habitual perjurer, still remains at large, and unpunished, and prays, that his Excellency will be pleased to institute an inquiry into those enormities, and to direct compensation to be made for the various losses they have sustained, in consequence of their unprovoked arrest.

The Lord Bishop of Meath has been pleased to appoint the Rev. Arthur Rolleston to the living of Kilcleagh, alias Moate, in the diocese of Meath, vacant by the death of the late Rev. Thomas English.
