The Earl of Belfast has left Batt's hotel, London, for his seat in Ireland.

The Earl of Hopetown, father of General, Lord Niddry, (late Sir John Hope) died on the 29th ultimo at Hopetown house.

Wheat again experienced a decline in London. It fell five shillings per quarter on Monday, according to the private letters of the date of Monday evening.

The notorious Robert Roberts was on Saturday, at the Old Baily, after a long trial, found guilty of having a felonious conspiracy, stolen and negotiated bank notes to the amount of £1,900, taken from the Windsor Coach last No- vember. He was sentenced to seven years transportation.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to confer the honor of Knighthood upon Stephen May, Esq. late Member of Parliament for the borough of Belfast, which he vacated on his being appointed Collector of the Customs at that port.

The magnificent piece of plate to be presented to the Duke of Wellington by the merchants and others of London, is to be formed as a column, about six feet high, and ornamented with appropriate devices by the most skillful artists.
