A few years since, the large quantity of goods piled in lines along the whole of the parade, and the immense multitude of purchasers, made it difficult and sometimes dangerous to force a passage to the castle. So great a falling off cannot be wholly attributed to the general depression of business; but it affords a deplorable proof of the low ebb to which the woollen trade, so important to this part of Ireland, is now reduced.

On Tuesday night, an armed party went to the house of Lawrence Phelan, between Ballyragget and Castlecomer, and having beat and abused Phelan and his two brothers, swore them to quit the farm, as it had not been unoccupied, previously to their entering on the possession, the full term prescribed by caravat legislation. Having tied the men, they broke the furniture, and carried off the whole of the stock a little way, but finally restored the cattle, &c after denouncing vengeance on the Phelans if they did not obey the orders they had received.—*Kilkenny Moderator.*

On Monday last a race was run over the course at Breefy, for thirty guineas, one two mile heat, between the horses of Captain John Brown, of this town, and Captain Le Mesurier, and Mr. Skeane, of the 68th Light Infantry, all rode by the owners, which was won by Captain Brown. A vast multitude attended—the *Potteen* was in very great demand, and this stimulant, as usual, brought the shillelah into very active employment.—*Mayo Constitution.*

On Monday the 3d inst. between the hours of ten and eleven o'clock in the afternoon, while James Fogarty of Clonlesmullen, Esq. with his servants were at the Chapel of Drum, (one female excepted,) his house was entered by two ruffians, who took from thence, two guns and a shot pouch. The alarm been given as soon as possible to Mr. Gibson, chief of police, stationed at Burrisoleigh, he, with his constables, and Lieutenant Butler of 97th Regiment, with a party, turned out with the greatest alacrity, assisted by all the Gentlemen of the neighbourhood, and made a most diligent search throughout the surrounding country, but we are sorry to say, for the present to no purpose.—*Clonmel Paper.*

A correspondent from Armagh informs us, that during the absence of Arthur Irwin, Esq. and his family from their residence in Thomas Street, in that city, a gang of villains had contrived to enter the house. From time to time they carried away and disposed of considerable quantities of the furniture.—Lately, Mr. Irwin sent one of his servants to the place, probably to arrange matters for his return. The man on entering the hall, was astonished at finding every thing there in utter confusion. On hearing a noise of some person moving softly overhead, he went up stairs, and in one of the rooms, saw a fellow endeavouring to ascend the chimney. He caught the robber by the feet, and, after a considerable struggle secured him.—The whole gang have been committed to Armagh gaol. The ringleader's name is Queen. The thieves had opened the beds, and removed and sold a good deal of the feathers.—*Newry Telegraph.*

At the last meeting of the Linnæan Society, a curious paper was read, giving an account of the ancient inhabitants of Guadaloupe, near the spot where the fossil human skeleton was found. It is believed that the skeletons of the warriors, killed in the battle between the Caribes and Galipes, in 1710, where speedily encrusted with the calcareous sand of the place; and that this recently-formed stone, constitutes the rock in which the fossil skeleton was found.

The following case which is of a nature to excite considerable interest among publicans, was tried in the Sheriff's court, in Newcastle, (England) on Wednesday se'nnight:—

**DANDY v. FEATHERSTON.**—The Defendant being much addicted to drinking spirits, was during the latter part of the last year and the beginning of the present, in the habit of frequenting the Plaintiff's house, for the purpose of indulging his unfortunate propensity, whereby he contracted a debt of several pounds for spirits delivered to him in Plaintiff's house at various times, in amount from one shilling to seventeen shillings at a time, to recover which the Plaintiff brought this action. The Plaintiff's evidence proved that the Defendant generally went to the Plaintiff's house in a state of intoxication, and that with whatever spirits he ordered he was readily supplied, usually to the extent of 14 to 37 glasses at a sitting! "One item in the Plaintiff's bill was for 37 glasses on Sunday the 28th of January last!!" The Defendant's friends conceiving the conduct of the Plaintiff reprehensible in allowing spirits to be furnished to him in the manner above stated, advised him to resist the publican's demand, and to test his defence on the 24th George II. c. 40 commonly called the "tippling act," whereby it is enacted, "that no person shall be entitled unto or maintain any cause, action, or suit for, or recover either in law or equity, any sum or sums of money, debts of money, debt or demands whatsoever, for or on account of any spirituous liquors, " unless such debt shall have really been and *bona fide* contracted at one time to the amount of 20s. or upwards," which statute the learned Recorder, on the trial, was clearly of opinion was an effectual bar to the plaintiff's recovering in this action, and consequently the Defendant had a verdict.
