FERMOY BANK.

In our last we stated the substance nearly of what passed at the meeting held in Fermoy, relative to the affairs of this establishment; we have been favoured with further particulars, which, at this moment, may prove interesting to many of our readers. The Resolutions, from which we have taken extracts, were proposed by Lord Donersile, and seconded by the Honourable Richard Hare-they speak the feelings of the Landed and Commercial interests of this City and County .- Previous to the Resolutions being passed, it was agreed, "that an open Committee should be held on Saturday, the 29th inst. to receive and hear the suggestions and observations of any Creditor who may choose to attend it."

The first Resolution " contemplates the embarrassments in which Mr. Anderson is invelved, with deep and sincere regret, not only with reference to his misfortune, as an individual whose active, continued, and successful exertions to the improvement of the country entitle him to the sympathy and esteem of every true triend to Ireland, but viewing his calamity as connected with our common interests and with those of the

public at large. The second declares the necessity of Mr. Andesson's suspending his payments to be attributed to circumstances which have exposed him to a variety of losses, against whom no human foresight or: human precau tion could guard, as well as to the sudden and onexampled fall in the value of landed property.

The third expresses the improvement within the last 30 years of the South of Ireland, and the persevering spirit of enterprise and intelligence, with which Mr. Anderson has, for that period, supported and promot-

The fourth declares the conviction of this meeting in Mr. Anderson's upright intentions and hanourable dealing, and that the arrangement of his affairs will be aided by every exertion on his part for the true interest and security of his Creditors.
