

THE ARMY.

Captain J. H. Elrington, on the half pay of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Light Dragoons, is appointed Major of the Tower of London, in the room of Lachlan Maclean, deceased.

The 2d battalion of the 89<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Foot, is arrived at Chatham, from Portsmouth.

Tuesday week a troop of Royal Waggon Train arrived in Canterbury, and next day embarked at Dover, to join the British army in France.

The 42d Regiment marched into Edinburgh Castle from Queensbury House Barracks, Canongate. Two companies of the Regiment more marched for Stirling.

The 20th Regiment of Cavalry have arrived at Waterford. Four troops are to proceed to another destination, and four troops are to remain in that city.

The Hon. General S. Mahon, M. P. for the Co. Roscommon, has been appointed to the command of the West district. He has arrived in Athlone, which he has chosen for his station, and has assumed the command of that district.

We understand, that the Lord Lieutenant in Council, has sanctioned Mr. Knapp's appointment to the Chief Magistracy of the city of Cork.

On the night of the 20th ult. a house, situated near the verge of the Counties of Monaghan and Louth, which had formerly been an inn, and is the property of a person who resides in Drogeeda, was maliciously set on fire in three different places and destroyed, by some unknown midnight ruffians.

On the night of the 21st inst. prodigious flashes of lightning shot across the Rostrevor mountains. By one of these a solid rock of granite, probably about eight tons in weight, was rent into pieces. One fragment presented the appearance of a flag, of about a hundred weight. The remainder was shattered into atoms.
