NOTICE.

THE Commissioners of Inland Excise and Taxes in Ireland, hereby give Notice, that by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament (56th Geo. III. c. 112) it is declared unlawful for any person, not duly authorized by law, in his behalf, to have or keep in his or her custody or possession any Still, Wash, or Potale, Low Wines or Singlings, or to be owner or proprietor, or have, receive, or derive any benefit, use, profit, or advantage, of or from any Still, Still Head, or Worm of a Still, kept, used and worked in any place not being a licensed Distillery, or of or from any Still, Wash, Potale, Low Wines, Singlings, or Spirits made, brewed, fermented, or distilled in any place not being a licensed Distillery; and if any person not so duly authorized, shall have, or keep in his or her custody, or possession, any Still, Still Head, or Worm, or Singlings, or shall be owner or proprietor, or part owner or proprietor of any Still, Still Head, or Worm, or of a Still, or shall have, receive, or derive any benefit, use, profit or advantage of or from any Still, Still Head, or Worm of a Still, or of or from any Still, Wash, Potale, Low Wines, Singlings or Spirits, contrary to the provisions of said Act, every such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour; and it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace within his Jurisdiction on Information on Oath of any such offence, to issue his warrant for the apprehension of such person or persons, and on examination into the complaint, to commit such person to goal, there to remain delivered by due course of law; and that whenever any person shall be convicted of a misdemeanour, or for any transportable offence under said act, or any other act for suppression of Illicit Distillation, the Court is authorized in the place of any other punishment for such misdemeanour, or of such punishment by transportation, to order that such offender, appearing to be of competent age, and free from any bodily infirmity, shall be kept for such term, not exceeding two years in case of any first offence, and not exceeding five years in cases of any second or further offence on board any ship, hulk, or vessel properly accommodated for the purpose, and to be employed in hard labour in the raising sand, soil and gravel from, and cleansing any navigable river; or any Port, Harbour, or Haven in Ireland, or in any other service for the benefit of the Navigation of any such River, Port, Harbour, or Haven, or in any other public works upon the banks or shores thereof.

And the said Act provides, that whenever any person shall be convicted of any misdemeanour under any Act for suppression of Illicit Distillation, upon the evidence of any inhabitant (not being an officer of Customs or Excise) of the townland or place where the offence was committed; the said inhabitant (or any other such inhabitant) having previously given information on oath before a Justice of the Peace, previous to the first day of the assizes, the Court before whom such conviction shall be had, shall impose one half only of the fine on such townland or place, (such conviction or imposition of such fine being had at the same assizes) and shall also suspend the levying of such half of such fine for twelve calendar months, and then to be altogether remitted in case no fine shall be imposed on such townland or place within that period; but if any fine shall be imposed on such townland or place within that time, then such suspended half of the fine shall be forthwith levied in the same manner, and with the like powers, as any fine may be levied in cases where no apportionment shall have been made.

And that if on any trial at any assizes for imposing any fine on any townland or place, it shall satisfactorily appear to the court, that information in writing, on oath, was given by an inhabitant (not being a revenue officer) to the justice of the peace, or officer of excise or customs residing nearest the place where offence committed (which information, said justice and officer are authorized to take of such unlicensed still, or part of a still, or appendage to a still or worm, or vessel for distilling spirits, or wash, potale, low wines, or singlings, having been found or used respectively in such place within such townland or place, in consequence of which information such illicit article shall have been seized, and such trial shall have been instituted, or if it shall appear to the court that the offender was tried and convicted of such offence, on the information and evidence of such inhabitant, or of some other such inhabitant, then no fine shall be imposed on such townland or place, on account of such offence, of which such information shall have been given and conviction had.

And the court before whom any person shall be convicted of any offence against the Laws for suppressing Illicit Distillation, is authorized to order upon the
