FERE Commissioners of Island Excise and Taxes to Irecand, hereby give Nonce, that by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament (56th Geo. 11). c. 112) it is declared untawful for any purson, not duly authorized by law, in has behalf, to have or keep in his or her restudy or possession any World, Wesh, or Potele, Low Wines or Suglings, or to be owner or proprietor, or have, receive; or derive any Leneli . use, profit, or advantage, of or from any Still, Still Head, or Worm of a Still, kept, used and worked in cay place not hoing a licensed Distillery, or of or from ony Warts, Wash, Potale, Low Wines, Singhogs, or Spirits made, brewed, fermented, or distribed in any place not being a Licensed Disidiery; and if any person not so duly authorised, shall have, or keep to his or har custody, or possessient, suy Worts, Wash, Law Wives, or Singlings, or shall be owner or propuelor, or part owner or proprietor of any Stri, Suit Head or Worm, of a Still, or small base, sective, or derive any henefit, use, posfit or advantage of or from any Son, Still Hoad, or Worm of a Sail; or of or from any Worte, Wash, Potale, Low Wines, Singlings or Spirits, contracy to the provisions of said Act, every such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeasure ; and it shall be lawf it for any Justice of the Peace within his Juris. diction on information on Oath of any such offence, to issue his warrant for the apprehension of so & person de pers us, and on examination july the complaint, to commit such person to gant, there to remain delivered by due course of law ; and that whenever any person shall be convicted of a mademesnor, or for soy transportable offence ouder said acr, or any other act for suppression of libert Distillation, the Court is suthorized in the place of any other pumshment for such consdemnanor, or of such punishment by iranse portation, to order that such off ader, appearing to be of competent age, and free from any be dily infirmity; shall be kept for such term, not exceeding two years in case of any first offence, and not exceeding five years to cases of any second or further offence on board any ship, bulk, or vessel properly accommutated for the purpose, and to be employed in hard labour in the raising sand, soil and gravel from, and cleaning any navigable rivers or any Port, Harbohr, or Unven in Ireland, or in any other service for the benefit of the Navigation of any such River, Port, Esthour, of Baven, or in any other public works upon the ugalis or shores the end.

And the said Act provides, that whenever any person shall be convicted of any misdemeanor under any Act for suppression of High Distribution, spon the evidence of any inhabitant (not being an officer of Customs or Excise) of the townland or place where the offence was committed; the said inhabitant (or any other such inhabitant) having previously given information on eath before a Justice of the Peace, previous to the first day of the assizes, the Court before whom such conviction shall be had, shall impose one half only of the fine on such townsand or place. (such conviction or imposition of such fine being had at the same assizes) and shall also suspend the levying of such half of such fine for twelve calendar ut nihr, and then to be altogether remitted in case no fine that he imposed on such townlind or place within that period! but if any fine shall be imposed on such townland or place within that lime, then such suspended half of the fine shall be forthwith levied in the same attoner, and with the like powers, as any fine may be levied in cased

where no applorment shall have been made.

And hat if on any trial at any assezes for imposing any fine on any townland or place, it shall satisfactorily appear to the court, that information in writing, on outh, was given by an inhabitant (not being a revenue officer) to the justice of the peace, or officer of excise or customs residing nextest the place whose offence committed (which information, said justice and office? are authorised to take of such unlicensed still, or part of a still, or appendage to a still or worm, or utcost for dist-lling spirits, or wash, potate, low wines, or singlings, having been found or used respectively is such place within such townsand or place, in coassqueuce of which information buth illicit settele shall have been soized, and such trial shall have been neticated, or if it shall appear to the court that the offender was tried and convicted of such offence, on the information audevidence of such inhabitant, or of some other such inhabitati, then no fine shall be supposed on such townland or place, on account of such offence, of which such information shall have been given and conviction had,
