

MISTRESSING CASE.

A distressing account appears in the *Calcutta* Thursday week:—
 last week, an unfortunate man in Edinburgh lost his life. A widow, and three helpless children, only three years of age, and another the unhappy sufferers by this event.—
 confidential clerk in a respectable house in London, distinguished for intelligence superior to his station, his conduct through life marked by the strictest sobriety. About six weeks ago he fell into the hands of a villainous and unscrupulous scoundrel, and in spite of every effort to divert his mind, he gradually increased. While in London he was given a quantity of laudanum; but, by the advice of his wife, he was prevailed upon to take a course of medicine, and his language and fixed determination to affect his purpose, and certain; and his wife, aware that the part of others would only have accelerated her distress, still indulging the hope that she might be able to divert him from his purpose, she interested youth about thirteen, never failing to attend to him, to accompany him to the theatre, and to be in the way to return with him, and the wife and son during this interval lived than described. On Tuesday morning, five o'clock, he stole from his bed, and by his son, and afterwards by his wife, he contrived in a few minutes to get out of his family, and finally committed the deed which laid him, who had hitherto been their inmate protector, lifeless at their feet. On this catastrophe, he read to his wife the following lines, which appeared to have been partly written by him. They were found in his pocket, and describe in a very striking manner the which he fell a victim:—
 Misfortune takes her stand,
 The cup is full,
 It is mixed; and drink it to the dregs;
 Be it so. But will that drink suffice;
 Oblivion, cancel injuries,
 Make to thee—faithful unfortunate,
 Fate. And ye, poor innocents!
 Sent tells me it will not.
 Also more.—Distraction!
 In?
 Imp of darkness—Despair!
 Assault me?—Curst impiety!
 Hur thee!
 You know't the texture and the frame
 Of man were not left free,
 I?—A passive agent.
 Lead? Reverts it not against me?
 The distraction. It I can chace,
 Against insanity! For once I'll try.
 Coherence. Perhaps I'll conquer,
 So far. To-morrow is to face,
 Right." This is not clear,
 I say so. But to say
 Distinct and separate things,
 Could in this philosophy,
 Laid upon my mind,
 Pant, wilful, prone to vice,
 Fact does belye it. No;
 Of my life was regular;
 I, leaned to what was right,
 Addle to myself; how stands it?
 — but — perhaps —
 —. The reason why and wherefore
 Clarity?
 —! immeasurable horror!
 —Oh! fatal credulity!
 It, to me and mine,
 —No, not a crevice!
 —is the circle, and I the centre—

We have received the following account of a melancholy accident which occurred at Lisheen, near Cragbrien, yesterday—a poor man with his wife and three children, constructed a shed against a ditch, and owing to the great fall of rain, the butment loosened, and some stones which were on the top fell through, and killed the three children, almost instantaneously, and the unfortunate man only survived a few hours; the mother who had left them for the purpose of gathering potatoes escaped probably the like fate.—(*Clare Journal.*)
