By the Lisbon Mail, a letter has been received from the agent at Lloyd's, by the committee, dated the 24th ult. It states, that several Russian and Swedish vessels had been detained and searched off the rock by a pirate or privateer, on the 20th of that month. It deserves particular notice, that among the vessels so situated near the mouth of the Tagus there were two of them under English colours, which the pirate or privateer did not think fit to approach. This proceeding is supposed to be by the same polacre rigged vessel which had been seen off that coast, and had before detained and captured several merchantmen. Two suspicious vessels were discovered off St. Michael's, about the middle of Aug. which are presumed to be privateers.

THE ARMY.

A general court martial has been held at Gibraltar, on the 4th March, 1816, when Lieut. Charles West, of the 2d bat. of the 11th foot, was arraigned on the under mentioned alle- gations, viz.—

1. For having been the bearer of a challenge, in order to fight a duel, from Capt. Arnaud, of the 11th foot, to Lieut. Harper, of the 67th regiment, on or about the 19th of Jan. 1816.
2. For having been the bearer also of a challenge, in order to fight a duel, from Capt. Arnaud, of the 11th foot, to Capt. M'Dougal, of the same regiment, on or about the 15th day of Jan. 1816.
3. For behaving in a scandalous and infamous manner, unbecoming the character of an officer and a gentleman, in giving evidence on oath before the general court martial held on Capt. Arnaud; grossly and falsely mis-stated and mis-represented his own conduct, as connected with one of the charges against Captain Arnaud, for having sent a challenge to Capt. M'Dougal, more particularly by having falsely represented himself as having wished to bring about a reconciliation between the parties, and by denying his having delivered any message relative to a challenge, when he had previously stated out of court that he had done so.

Upon which charges the court having maturely considered them, and the evidence produced by the prosecutor as well as by the prisoner, were of opinion, as to the 1st charge, Lieut. West is guilty: as to the 2d charge, that he is guilty of so much of that charge as states that he was the bearer of a challenge to Capt. M'Dougal, but the Court is of opinion that he was not authorised so to do by Capt. Arnaud; and, as to the 3d charge, that he, Lieut. West, was guilty.

The Court therefore, having found him guilty of the whole of the first and third charges, and of so much of the second, the sentence of the Court, therefore is, that the prisoner, Lieut. West, be *Cashiered*, which sentence has been sanctioned and confirmed.

ROBBERY—On Tuesday night last, two villains entered the house of Richard Henn, Esq. of Kilrush, and carried off his desk, containing notes to the amount of two hundred guineas. On the following morning, Major Miller, and Dr. O'Shaughnessy, P. P. repaired to the place, and on investigation they found Mr. Henn, had discharged a servant of the name of Michael Shehan about a month previous, and finding the desk, rifled and broke, in an adjoining garden, led them to suspect it must be some of the domestics of the house were concerned; Major Miller, with his usual promptness, ordered some peace officers to surround Shehan's lodging and had him brought for examination to his office in Kilrush; in the same house there was a notorious character of the name of Lillis, whom they likewise took into custody; after several hours examination Shehan confessed he had the money, and that Lillis was his accomplice; he was then brought to where he said the money was hid, but no money was to be found—it had been stole by Lillis and buried in another field, where it was recovered by the exertions of Dr. O'Shaughnessy.
