We stop the Press to acknowledge the London Jour-  
nals of Sunday and Monday, in course. The London  
papers of Monday mention the arrival of dispatches  
from Lord Exmouth of the 3d inst which advise his  
Majesty's government of the complete and perfect exe-  
cution of the treaty with the Dey of Algiers. Some  
delay had taken place, in consequence of the Dey being  
desirous to retain in prison two Spaniards, who had  
suffered long confinement; but Lord Exmouth insisted  
upon every christian captive, no matter what country or  
Sect, coming within the plain principle upon which  
the Treaty was dictated; and the Dey, who has alrea-  
dy had an excellent specimen of Lord Exmouth's  
cogent mode of argument, conceded the point, and  
sent the two Spaniards on board the Queen Charlotte,  
where they were when the dispatches were sent off.—  
This is all right. The Treaty, the whole Treaty, and  
nothing but the Treaty, could satisfy the justice of the  
United Kingdom. The uttermost condition must be  
fulfilled, and not a Christian Captive left in the  
dungeons of Algiers.

ARDSOLLAS COURSE—SEPTEMBER 20, 1816.

The Clare Gold Cup, for Clare Bred Hunters, carrying  
very high weights (see articles in Calendar, 1807) was walked  
over for by Mr James Creagh's c. g. Whitehouse, 4 yrs. old.  
—As part of the Inscription on the Cup records his History,  
we anticipate that it must prove acceptable to our Sporting  
Readers, and we (*Enn's Chronicle*), therefore annex it.

That future Sportsmen well may know,  
The source from whence this Cup did flow,  
It thus records—"The Sons of Clare  
For Steeds renowned, and Women fair,  
Two Hundred Guineas did subscribe,  
To him who's of the Sporting 'Tribe—  
Tom Steele—who did the Fund collect,  
Its shape and beauty both direct;  
Completed it—a Golden Store,  
In Seventeen-hundred Ninety-four,  
In Clare to rest till Clare's no more.

It is now *Twenty two* years since its institution—*Twelve*  
of which it remained in possession of Mr. Vandeleur of Ra-  
labine, who won it *three* times; the other winners of it were  
the late Mr. Canny, of Castlefergus, Major Colpoys Mr.  
Studdert, of Kilkishen House, and Mr Henry White. The  
unsuccessful challengers were Mr O'Callaghan, Mr. Downes,  
Mr. Simon Creagh, and Mr. Molony, of Kiltannon. The  
present stewards are Sir Edward O'Brien General Fitzgerald,  
Colonel Stamer, Mr. Creagh, and Mr. Vandeleur.
